THE RAGHUBIR LIBRARY

(Introduction by Sir Jadunath Sarkar).

The classic land of Mālwa was once the fountain, head of Indian learning and culture. Will it again be a magnet to draw scholars from all parts of a free India? Such a glorious future for the province, in one particular branch of historical studies at least, has been made possible by a library now in course of rapid growth, of which the world knows nothing. It is the Raghubir Library, located at Sitamau, the capital of a small Rajput State lying 70 air-miles north of Ujjain. The town is off the railway track, but a regular bus service running through it from Mandsaur on the B.B.C.I. line 20 miles west of it, to Shamgarh on the G.I.P. line 28 miles eastwards, makes the place easy of access.

The creation of this library is due to the patriotic zeal, foresight, and persistence of an enlightened prince, Dr. Raghubir Sinh, the eldest son of the Maharaja of Sitamau. After passing the Law and M.A. examinations of the Agra University, he took a D.Litt. degree by a learned historical thesis on Malwa in Transition (1936), which has become the standard authority on the subject. Since then he has varied his experience by serving as an administrator of his father's State and doing military duty as an emergency-commission Major in the Indian Observer Corps during the late war with Japan. He has built this library up by judicious planning, expert advice, and alert watching for rare books as they come into the market in Europe.

The mediæval history of India down to the very dawn of the modern age with the establishment of British

paramountcy in 1803, cannot be written without a knowledge of the Persian language, and for the 17th and 18th centuries of Marathi as well. The greater portion of the Persian sources are still unprinted, and their manuscript copies are rarely available in India. The oldest, completest, and best-transcribed copies of most Persian histories and State-papers of the Muslim period are preserved in the public libraries of Europe, and our patriotism naturally feels hurt at so many of our best historical material having gone out of our country. But in one way it was a blessing. If they had not been acquired and sent to Europe so early, but left in Indian hands, they would in most cases have been totally lost during the long years of anarchy, warfare, and the decay of our noble families that maintained libraries and writers. To take one instance only: Sir Henry M. Elliot, the Foreign Secretary of Lord Dalhousie, wisely used his rare opportunities to collect a large number of mss on the Mughal Empire and sent them to London, just in time to escape the Sepoy Mutiny of 1857, in which they would most certainly have been destroyed during the fighting in Delhi, Lucknow, Agra and all over Upper India. Their having been sent to England was a providential means of saving them for the scholarly world, because the Elliot collection contains several works of which there is no second copy anywhere else in the world. So, too, I traced in the Bibliotheque Nationale of Paris a Persian ms-the Baharistan-i-Ghaibi, giving a most detailed and authentic history of Bengal and Assam during Jahangir's reign (1608-1624), in 520 pages, of which no other copy is known to exist and whose very name was unknown before.

The removal of such rare manuscripts to Europe has been compensated for, so far as we in India are concerned, by the progress of modern photography which has made it possible to take exact copies of them very cheaply. Copying with the hand can never be fully reliable, but a photographic reproduction almost places the manuscript

itself before us for our study. The cheapest of these photographs are "rapid rotary bromide prints" (called rotographs for shortness.) In them the paper appears as black and the writing as white. A little higher in cost but more clear to read are photostats, in which the writing is black and the paper white or greyish. A device for very greatly reducing the cost of reproduction and storage-space is the microfilming of mss, or photographing them in reels like miniature cinema films. The Americans first made extensive use of this last device to take copies of numberless manuscripts and rare books from the British Museum, the Bodleian, and the Public Record Offices of England, for intensive study by their scholars without having to leave America. The microfilms have to be read by enlargement under electric light with the help of a little machine. But ordinary photographers in India can make photostats from these microfilms, for the benefit of scholars where there is no enlarger (Recordak) or electric light at hand.

But the old old system of copying mss with the hand is not yet dead, and even today the most useful transcripts are hand-written copies collated carefully with the original. This I have found to be the case in the long course of my study of Persian mss and photostats now extending over 47 years.

Dr. Raghubir Sinh by consulting the famous Persian catalogues of the British Museum (by Rieu), the Bodleian (Sachau and Ethé), the India Office Library, London (Ethé), and other world-known collections, has picked out the most useful and the rarest mss on Indian history and microfilmed or photostated them. He has, besides, employed two scribes at home to copy other mss or make duplicates from the photostats. He has also taken copies of nearly all the Persian mss that I have collected during a long life of study and exploration and which are noticed in my own historical writings. He has levied similar contribution on the State libraries of Rampur, Udaipur and other places in India, as well as the Royal Asiatic Society of Bengal.

The result so far achieved is highly creditable, as will be seen from the following hand list. The Raghubir Library is unique in the world for the completeness of its sources on the mediæval history of India. Nowhere else can one find all of these materials in one place. In one particular but most valuable section, the akhbarat or hand-written news-letters in Persian, extending from 1659 to 1830 A.D. and the administrative records of the Jaipur State and the Peshwas' Government, written in Dingal and Persian, the Raghubir collection is sure to attract students of these branches from all parts of the world. These records not only give absolutely contemporary and correct dates, names, and reports of events, but also serve to illustrate our preceding indigenous system of administration in its actual working and the details that touched the lives of the people. In this respect they exactly serve the same purpose as the late Greek papyri discovered in Egypt which relate to the administration of that country by its early Arab conquerors.

The Raghubir Library has specialised in the history of the Delhi Padishahs and the local dynasties of Malwa, Gujrat and Rajputana, to the point of exhaustion. Also the numerous letter-books of the officers who in that age always employed Persian secretaries, whether Hindu or Muslim

Next to the Persian, and for the last half of the 18th century even more valuable than the Persian sources, are the Marathi records and letters. The Raghubir Library has purchased all of this class available in print, besides several important manuscript collections, such as the Athlayé, the Gulgulé and a few other family archives of historical interest.

The English collection,—which is constantly growing up, contains many necessary but extremely scarce works. Among them mention may be made of the Asiatic Annual Register (1799—1811), the Asiatic Journal and Monthly Register (a complete set, 1816—1846), Philpart's East India

Military Calendar (3 vols., 1823-26), Dodeswell and Miles' Alphabetical List of the E. I. Co.'s Medical Officers (1837), Prinsep's Ameer Khaun (1829), and the small anonymous History of the first Maratha War published in London in 1781. I wonder if any other public library in India has all or even half of these books.

The existence and richness of this library should be made widely known, so that its precious possessions may be put to the best use by seekers after historical knowledge. No Indian, in particular, will be pardoned if he neglects this collection at our doors and then complains of the lack of original sources in India as an excuse for his idleness or shoddy work in the field of Indian historical studies.

If ever a central Institute of History is set up in free India, the Raghubir Collection will be its indispensable nucleus. Before that ideal takes shape, the University of Malwa cum Rajputana cannot do any research work in the immediate past of our land unless it fully utilises the Raghubir Library.

(9) PERSIAN DOCUMENTS FROM THE PESHWA DAFTAR, POONA

The Persian records in the Peshwa Daftar, Poona, collected from the Jamao Daftar and the Poona Residency Records, form some 29 bundles and contain a few important private documents of early times and a large body of newsletters (akhbarat) sent to the Resident at Poona (1796-1817 A.D.). A slender volume of miscellaneous Persian papers, edited by Dr. M. Nazim, was published as an extra volume to the "Selections from the Peshwa's Daftar" Series, mainly to give an idea of the nature of the contents of the documents in the Persian Daftar. With the kind permission of the Bombay Government, and whole-hearted co-operation of the Government Photo Registry Office, Poona, as much of the Persian Daftar as possible was microfilmed for the Raghubir Library, and later enlarged positive photo prints (size $7\frac{1}{2}$ " \times $4\frac{1}{2}$ ") of the same were made; which are

now available there. In microfilming these documents, due to extraordinary length of sheets of each written page, more often than not it was found necessary to take more than one picture of each page. Recently one volume covering the Delhi empire, 1751-52, edited by Prof. B. D. Verma, has been published.

These Persian papers were roughly classified into more than 80 different sections and were arranged and numbered accordingly without following any strict chronological arrangement. Pending a careful detailed examination of the entire mass of these documents and their proper classification and rearrangement, the section numbers given at Poona have been retained and referred to here mainly to avoid any unnecessary confusion.

Sreekrishna Vitthal Athalé of Shiposhi (Ratnagiri Dt.), a well-known critical scholar of Maratha history, had collected, copied and prepared for the press a large number of original documents relating to the Maratha history. The collection remained unpublished but intact, and along with other papers in his daftar, it was acquired in 1945 A.D. for the Raghubir Library. The whole daftar is yet to be critically examined with a view to sorting out and selecting important letters and documents for publication. (2) THE GULGULE DAFTAR

This daftar is the family property of Sardar Gulgule of Sarola in Kotah. The founder was appointed, (circa. 1745) to collect Maratha tribute from Rajputana; the Gulgules continued to be the pivot of the Maratha interests in Malwa and Rajputana, and their influence extended even to Delhi, Agra, Oudh and Allahabad. The daftar is of supreme importance for the history of affairs of Rajputana and Malwa during the fateful years 1790-1805. Sardar A. B. Phalke

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started the work of editing the Marathi papers in the daftar, and has so far published three volumes containing letters from this daftar under the title "Shinde-Shahi Itihasachin Sadhanen".

Typed copies of the entire Marathi daftar have been secured for the Raghuvir Library so as to be easily available for study. For easy reference and convenience in handling, the same have, however, been grouped into separate volumes, a rough list of which is given below.
