Alterations and Additions to Part A of the Dehra Dun District Gazetteer, bringing it up to date (1924).

CENSUS.

The population at the census of 1921 was 212,243 as compared with 204,888 in 1911. The area of the district has decreased from 1,193 square miles to 1,189 due to the exclusion of four villages—(1) Kharkhari, (2) Bhopatwala Khurd, (3) Bhopatwala Kalan, (4) Haripur Khurd.

The density of population over the whole district is thus 179 to the square mile. Jaunsar Bawar with an area of 443 square miles and a total population of 55,623 shows a density of approximately 125, whilst the Dun with an area of 743 square miles and a population of 156,620, shows a density of 211 per square mile.

The present population shows an increase of 7,355 over that of 1911 and 34,471 over that of 1901.

FORESTS.

The long-delayed settlement of rights in Jaunsar Bawar forests was completed by Mr. Panna Lal, r.c.s., in 1919. The chief difference in this settlement was the abolition of the two classes of Government forests: (1) those in which the people had no rights and (2) those in which the people had the right to graze cattle and cut fuel, but the Forest department could close any portion for the purpose of forest conservancy. Government forests are now classed together and both classes have now been thrown open to the exercise of rights. This settlement was a liberal one and has given the villagers much more in the way of grazing, lopping, and timber than they possessed before. At the same time their rights are definitely recorded in the records of rights for each "khatt". The change has worked well and the villager is undoubtedly now much better off than before the settlement. He still complains that his allotment of timber is too small and that the area of cultivation is exiguous, but that he will always do.

In the Dun the pressure of cultivation has induced many of the cultivators to cast envious eyes on the large grazing tracts, but the Forest department will not lightly surrender these.

WORKING PLANS.

The first working plan for most of the forests of the Dehra Dun division was drawn up by Mr. Fernandez. The plan itself was brought into force in 1888 for 15 years, but experimental work in connection with that had been started in 1883. The prescriptions laid down under the plan were Improvement fellings with the idea of removing old, deformed trees to make room for young generation which was in good condition.

Fernandez's plan terminated in 1903, when it was replaced by the plan drawn up by Mr. Milward and Mr. Jackson. forests were divided into five principal classes:—(1) sal forests, (2) hill forests, (3) shisham forest, (4) miscellaneous forests, and (5) bamboo forests. Sal forests except those of Tirsal and Thano placed under Improvement fellings. In Tirsal were again Selection Fellings were introduced. In Thano experimental treatment under "Uniform" and "Group" method was introduced which was altered by Mr. Troup, in 1910, by putting the whole forest under "Uniform" method. Some of the sal forests situated near Dehra Dun were worked under Coppice with standards which were eventually replaced, in 1917, by Improvement fellings. The Hill and shisham forests were to be worked under Selection system and Miscellaneous forests under Coppice with standards. Bamboos were to be cut over in every alternate year but subsequently, in 1917, a longer interval, that is three years, was interposed.

This plan would have terminated in 1927 but considering that the Improvement fellings had generally served their purpose of restoration and improvement, it was desirable that the full yield of the forests should be realized combined with up-to-date silviculture and forest management without waiting for the termination of the plan, so a new plan was drawn up by Mr. Bhola which came into force from 1st April, 1923. The forests under it have been divided into (1) sal forests, (2) hill forests, (3) miscellaneous forests, (4) bamboo forests, and (5) grass lands.

Sal forests are to be worked under "Uniform" method. Hill forests, as they are mainly protection forests, are still to be worked under Selection "system" (3) Miscellaneous forests are to be worked under Coppice with standards but the re-generation where it does not come up is to be fostered artificially. (4) Bamboos are to be worked on a rotation of four years (5) Grass lands have been opened out for grazing.

The main outlet for timber is to the plains. Practically the whole of the outturn of the timber is exported to Delhi, Meerut, Roorkee, Saharanpur, and certain districts of South West-Punjab. A fairly large quantity of sal M. G. sleepers is supplied to the railways.

Sal is usually converted into rafters 6' to 8' long, scantlings 10' or 12' long 4" wide and 5" deep, sleepers 6' and 9' long, and into logs and tors which find a ready sale.

Sain, which is next in importance to sal, is rising in demand and is converted into rafters, scantlings, and tors. Shisham commands a good price for cart-wheels and furniture but the supply is limited.

FIREWOOD.

There is a great demand for small fuel in Dehra Dun, Hardwar, Jwalapur, and Rikhikesh. But a large quantity is exported to Meerut, Roorkee, and Amballa.

BAMBOOS.

Bamboos fetch a good price for local requirements and for export to the plains but only a very limited quantity is available.

Other minor forest produce include limestone, grasses, gums, honey, wax, bones, and hides.

MANAGEMENT.

The Dehra Dun forest division was created in 1878, but in 1905 with the abolition of the School Circle it was amalgamated with the Saharanpur division, the combined division being called Siwalik, although each pertion was under a separate working plan. In 1918 the two divisions were again separated. The area of Dehra Dun division amounts to 279 square miles. The average yield in recent years has been sal timber 343,000 c. ft.; other timber 102,000 c, ft.; fuel 775,000 c. ft.; and bamboos about

500,000 (nos). The revenue has averaged Rs. 3,00,000 and expenditure Rs. 80,000, leaving a surplus of Rs. 2,20,000. The division is under the management of a Deputy Conservator of Forests, stationed at Dehra Dun. He is assisted by two gazetted assistants. For facility of administration, the forests have been divided into six Ranges, each under a Range Officer. The Ranges are Timbli, Malhan, Lachhiwala, Thano, Barkot, and Motichur.

FIRE PROTECTION.

The whole area except a few places which are burnt departmentally for grazing purposes and for the protection of adjoining forests is protected from fire. Systematic fire protection has been rendered very easy in the conditions prevailing in the Dun. The summer is short and the atmosphere is humid and it is only in exceptionally hot years that any considerable fires occur. Dry stream beds are very common and they act as natural fire lines, while the neighbouring villagers have to assist in extinguishing fire in return for grazing concessions. The failure per cent. to the area attempted for the last decade comes to 0.88. The cost of protection at present is nine pies per acre.

RIGHTS.

Under notification nos. 605F. of the 13th July, 1892, and 582F. of the 4th July, 1893, liberal privileges of free grazing for 1,840 cattle, collecting fallen fuel, thatching grass and green leaves for fodder, and to a large amount of building timber were granted.

AGRICULTURE.

There has been no marked change in the total cultivated area in recent years. The cultivation of sugarcane has attained great popularity; the area under sugarcane in 1324F. was 935 acres, while in 1330 F. it was 3,092 acres. The red variety is chiefly sown; this was introduced by the Agricultural department and it was found that wild animals do less damage to this than other kinds. The area under paddy cultivation is much the same, but basmati rice is becoming increasingly popular.

IRRIGATION.

The supply of canal water to the neighbourhood of Dehra town is inadequate except for about four months in the year.

The demand for the irrigation of private gardens, filling tanks, and building purposes leaves very little for irrigation of crops and villages on the south of Dehra, get a very meagre supply. To deal with this, the "Rajpur Feeder Project" was drawn up and is in process of completion. This consists of three parts:—

- (a) the Sansardhara feeder,
- (b) the feeder from the Kalanga canal to the Rajpore canal known as the Rajpore feeder.
- (c) the Kargi minor.

The first of these has been completed.

TEA GARDENS.

There has been no marked change in the area under tea in the last decennium. The chief feature is the gradual elimination of European ownership of tea estates; four more of these have been sold to Indian purchasers and very few European estates now exist. The years 1918 to 1921 were disastrous to the tea industry, but since then it has revived and the last year was the most prosperous for many years. The high prices which labour can command in Dehra and Mussoorie make it difficult for out-of-theway estates to obtain the requisite number of labourers—

PRESES AND NEWSPAPERS.

There are now 12 presses, seven of recent origin. The chief newspapers are the Voice of the Dun, Mussoorie Times, and Garhwali. The two former are chiefly employed for advertising.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The increase of motor traffic and financial stringency has had its inevitable effect in the deterioration of the roads. The glaring need of the district is a more modern means of transport between Rajpore and Musscorie. The completion of the motor read to Musscorie depends on the allotment of funds; it extends at present as far as Kolukhet; it is proposed eventually to skirt the Rajpore hazar and thus avoid a most congested part. The Electrical Tramway Co. has commenced work from Dehra and has done a considerable amount of excavation above Rajpore, but it will be a long time before the route is open to traffic. The chief need as regards pakka roads is the extension of the Dehra-Doiwala pakka road to meet the Hardwar road near

Rikhikesh road station; the land has been mapped out and acquired and the project only awaits the allotment of funds. The forest motor roads are a useful adjunct to our internal communication, but they become impassable in the rains.

CHANGES IN LANDED PROPRIETORS.

Chaudhri Digambar Singh of Donga died in 1919 and the estate is now managed by his brother, Chaudhri Sher Singh; Kunwar Balbir Singh died in 1921 and was succeeded by Kunwar Tegh Bahadur Singh, his brother. Lala Jyoti Sarup, proprietor of Markham Grant, died in 1920 and was succeeded by his brother, Rai Bahadur Har Swarup. The estate was encumbered and has since been sold with the permission of Government to the Raja of Jubal State.

The following pay the largest amount of revenue in Jaunsar Bawar:—

Nain Singh and Debi Ram of Khat Bawar, Dharam Singh of Seli and Salig Ram of Dasau.

COMMERCE AND ECONOMIES.

There has been no development in the last few years. The Dixon Chemical Co., founded for the manufacture of thymol and kindred products, has ceased work. There is a brisk import trade to Dehra and Mussoorie and transport agencies are doing well, but of productive industries there is nothing to record. The turpentine factory at Kalsi has ceased to work. Kalsi as a market town is rapidly declining and trade in that part has been diverted to Chuharpur. As a result of the war and of the influenza epidemic labour is scarce and double the price it was last decade.

BENCHES.

The bench of Honorary Magistrate, Dehra, consists of six Magistrates; of these three have 2nd class powers and when sitting together 1st class powers. Their jurisdiction has been extended over the whole of Dehra sub-division. This bench has proved itself most useful and has relieved the stipendiary magistrates of a large amount of case-work. Last year it decided 807 cases.

The Sahespur Bench consists of five magistrates; attendance is apt to be irregular, but they dealt with 115 cases in the course of last year. The Bench of Honorary Munsifs is now effete.

PUNCHAYATS.

The Punchayat Act came into force here in September, 1921; there are at present 22 punchayats working. At the outset these were not very popular but this feeling is gradually wearing off; the chief obstacle is the lack of litigation.

CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETIES.

Two previous attempts have been made to start co-operative banks in 1914 and 1918, but both these ended in failure. Strenuous afforts were made in 1922 and 1923 to organise this movement and there are now seven registered societies, and several more are in process of formation. It is hoped shortly to covert the organisation into a district co-operative bank.

POLICE.

The following changes have taken place in the Police department the last decade:—

- (1) a police station has been created at Garhi (Cantonment).
- (2) Kalsi outpost has now one head constable and four constables who have replaced the Town police referred to in the previous Gazetteer.
- (3) road police have been abolished in both at Kalsi and Sainji.

here is a proposal to build a police station at Rikhikesh and abolish the one at Ranipokhri. This would undoubtedly be agreat improvement, since Rikhikesh is a growing place and it is rduous and difficult for complainants to get to Ranipokhri to mke reports. The land has been acquired for the new police station and when funds are available the work will be taken in han

EXCISE.

here are now in the district 20 country spirit shops, 9 opin and 12 drugs. Receipts have steadily risen from Rs. 2,89,860 in \$15-16 to Rs. 4,62,641 in 1920-21. Whilst in these years the

consumption of country spirit has increased, that of drugs and opium has declined.

The Government distillery was closed down from 1st April, 1921. The district is now under the graduated surcharge fee system. Issues of country sprit and hemp drugs to the retail shops are made from the bonded warehouse.

The two breweries at Mussoorie have since closed down, but Dyer Meakin's brewery at Chakrata still produces beer for the troops; the output fluctuates with the number of troops stationed there.

STAMPS.

Owing to climatic advantages Dehra and Mussoorie are proving most popular to the pensioner class; this results in contant transfer of houses and lands which has led to an increase in the sale of non-judicial stamps. There was also a notable increase in 1919-20 due to the necessity of taking out licences for arns.

MUNICIPALITIES.

Mussoorie—during the war had bumper years. Europeans were unable to send their families to Europe and hotel and boarding-houses reaped a rich harvest. Many new shops were built and tradesmen earned huge profits. All this had a bneficial effect on the finances of the City Board. Since the war, however, the number of visitors has steadily diminished and there is a reaction from the boom. The Board is an up-tolate and progressive one, but is largely hampered in its schems by the fall in its income. Its greatest asset is the hydro-eletric scheme, which supplies both Rajpur and Dehra with lightingand power.

The first non-official chairman, Colonel Beer, C.I.E., was elected on 13th July, 1920.

The main expenditure is on water-works, electric works and drainage works. Two storage reservoirs for the water-suply have been completed on Gun Hill and Crag Top. The Lanour bazar drainage scheme and Happy Valley drainage scheme are the chief features of the sanitary works: the latter is not yet completed.

Dehra.—The first non-official chairman, Pandit Anand Narain, M.B.E., was elected on 3rd April 1919.

A new Town Hall has recently been constructed in Faltoo Lines at a total cost of Rs. 14,000. The constitution of the Board is as follows:—

The chief defect of Dehra is its water supply: there is an elaborate project of 11 lakhs, but this is not likely to mature unless Government provides a loan. In the hot months of the year this problem of supply is most acute, and there is the everpresent fear of an epidemic of disease owing to contamination from dirty canal water. The chief utility works since 1916 are the erection of water-flushed latrine and pail depots, and the construction of a municipal school in Mohalla Anand Chowk.

Rikhikesh—Was declared to be a notified area from 1st November, 1922. This is a place which is rapidly growing in popularity as a place of pilgrimage; it is situated on one of the most lovely parts of the Ganges and a steady stream of pilgrims comes from Hardwar.

The town contains a large number of dharamsalas and sarais for the convenience of pilgrims. The sanitation is most inadequate and the finances of the town are too slender at present to carry out any really progressive policy.

FOREST RESEARCH INSTITUTE.

The Imperial Research Institute has been constantly extended. In 1916 the estate consisted of 47.8 acres, but during the recent few years as a result of the war there was a great and rapid development and it became obvious that the existing Research Institute was quite insufficient for the growing needs of the department. In February, 1920, about 1,300 acres to the north-west of Dehra were acquired at a cost of Rs. 12,73,000 and building operations started in November, 1921. The new institute when complete will be most up-to-date; much has already been done; there are a saw mill and an iron work shop fitted with all the latest machinery, wood-seasoning kilns

of all kinds, wood-preservation plant, pulp and paper mill, wood workshop, veneer mill, timber testing laboratory, and offices for utilization of minor forest products.

The cost of the present scheme, which is not a complete one, is over 55 lakhs.

PRINCE OF WALES' ROYAL INDIAN MILITARY COLLEGE.

The College was formally opened by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on 13th March, 1922. The purpose of this College is to provide adequate facilities for the preliminary Training of Indians to fit them to enter the Royal Military College, Sandhurst Its purpose is thus to take the place of a public school training of Indians such as is obtainable in England. It aims at giving Indian boys a sound moral, physical, and scholastic education such as will fit them to pass the Sandhurst Entrance Examination and, later on, to hold the King's Commission.

NOTES.

CULTIVATION AND LAND REVENUE.

The average cultivated area for the last five years cannot be given owing to the district having been under settlement operations in 1325 fasli and 1326 fasli, for which the figures are not available.

The total cultivated area in 1328 fasli was 810,505 acres, of which 210,381 acres were irrigated and 600,124 dry.

The percentage of cultivated area in 1328 fasli in the four tabsils has been as follows:—

This gives a percentage of 69.9 for the whole district in 1328 fasli.

At present 73 per cent. of 210,381 acres of irrigated land is watered from canals, 24.6 per cent. from wells, and 2.4 per cent. from other sources. Of the total cultivated area in 1328 fasli, 26 per cent. was irrigated and 74 per cent. was dry. The aggregate area of the district was 1,168,688 acres, of which 13.1 per cent. was waste, 17.5 per cent. culturable, and 69.4 per cent. under cultivation.

Since 1322 fasli there has been no noteworthy suspension of revenue.

The demand for revenue and cesses in the year 1328 fasli for the district was as follows:—

Under the old settlement the total land revenue demand of the district was Rs. 16,82,910-1-10. The above figures, therefore, show an increase of Rs. 4,18,701-12-2 effected in the recent settlement.

IRRIGATION.

There has been no change in the irrigation channels of this district since 1916, so far as the Eastern Jumna canal is concerned.

BHIMGODA HEAD WORKS.

Ganges canal.

The Ganges canal was first opened in 1854 and is a monument to the genius and skill of Colonel Sir Proby Cautley who from inception to completion carried the work through.

The canal system has been greatly developed and extended since those early days and each decade has seen new record established in the area irrigated by the canal. It was realized that, for the canal to carry out its fullest functions, complete control of the supplies of the river was essential at the head of the canal near Hardwar.

The method of obtaining supplies for the canal inaugurated by Colonel Sir Proby Cautley and subsequently developed, as the demand for water increased, was of a temporary character put up each year after the monsoon had disappeared and washed away in the following June when the river rose to flood level. The canal proper is fed from a side channel of the river which was artificially widened and deepened when the canal work was first started. This side channel, now known as the supply channel, runs past the town of Hardwar and on its right bank the Harkipairi bathing pool and all the other bathing ghats of Hardwar are situated. The supply channel near its head, splits up into two channels called supply channel no. 1 and no 2 respectively and the bed levels of these channels are such that, during the seasons of low supplies in the river no water would pass down them at all were not artificial means employed to make it do so. Before the canal was built, these artificial means were carried out by the inhabitants of Hardwar themselves when, to quote Sir Proby Cautley,

"From this branch the inhabitants of Hardwar and Kankhal had been in the habit of bringing a water-course for the purpose of supplying the towns, the priests being interested in maintaining water at their ghats or bathing places, the community in general depending upon the supply both for drinking and culinary purposes, for turning corn mills and to a moderate extent for the irrigation of the gardens."

The method of supplying the canal at first took the form of a temporary spur built out into the river just below the mouth of supply channel no. 1. As demand for water increased, this gradually evolved into two complete temporary dams across the main bed of the river below the mouth of supply channel nos. 1 and 2 respectively, which in conjunction with a similar dam across the Chilla channel of the river, turned the whole of the supply of the river into the supply channel from which the canal itself was fed by regulating works at Mayapur.

These temporary dams were formed by lines of timber crates laid across the river bed and then filled up with boulders in horizontal layers. The dam below the mouth of supply channel no. 2 was in addition faced with layers of grass mats and shingle in order to render it more water-tight, and the surface leakage through these temporary dams was rarely more than 600 cusecs after they had been completed. These temporary dams were washed away each year on the bursting of the monsoon and are open to two serious objections which became of more and more moment as irrigation developed.

The temporary dams which cost Rs. 50,000 to build annually, could not be commenced until the monsoon had disappeared and the river had dropped to a safe level. They further could not be completed in under a period of six weeks owing to the amount of work involved, and there was thus a period of some two months after the rains had practically ceased, in which little or no water was available in the canal in spite of, very often, an intense demand for it.

The second disability the canal suffered from was in the case of a prolonged break in the rains, when full supply in the canal was a necessity to cope with the intense demand for water to save the crops from withering. Owing to the temporary dams

having been washed away this full supply could not be given and it is estimated that, during the prolonged break in the rains which occurred in 1918, the preventable loss to the country in the area fed by the canal exceeded in value the total cost of the new head works by which it is hoped such loss will in future be rendered impossible.

The new Bhimgoda head works have been built to remove the serious disabilities referred to above, and are designed to give complete control over the supplies in the river during all seasons throughout the year. The first preliminary project was got out in 1910 and the estimate for this project which amounted to Rs. 25,83,499, was sanctioned in the Secretary of State's despatch received with G. O. no. 4223, dated the 13th May, 1912. The project consists of a scheme for two separate weirs. One of these was across the main river a short distance below the site of the temporary dams and the other across the head of the Chilla Channel to divert its supply down to the lower weir. A regulator was to be provided on the right flank of the main weir at Bhimgoda and all necessary training works and embankments.

Subsequent investigations and observations of the river channel showed that the position of the headworks could be moved most advantageously to a site three-quarters of a mile lower down the river where its whole discharge is confined to one channel. This obviated the disadvantage of the previous proposal which entailed two separate weirs; the proposition of the flood discharge taken by each of which depended largely on the vagaries of the river. Actual experience on the collection of materials also enabled the probable cost of the work to be more correctly determined. This experience together with a better realization of the magnitude of the work to be carried out and the means necessary therefor, led to a revised estimate being made out for the project as amended.

This revised estimate amounted to Rs. 33,78,324 and was sanctioned by the Secretary of State in his despatch no. P.W./39, dated the 4th September, 1914.

Preliminary work and collection of materials was started in the working season of 1912-13 and actual construction on the new headworks in 1913-14. The contractor who originally took up the contract for the whole work failed after the first season and threw up his contract. The work was subsequently taken up by Messrs. Abbott Brothers, Jhansi, who, at length, completed it in May, 1920.

The head works consist of a weir 1,300 feet long divided into six bays of 300 feet each. In continuation of the line of the weir, on its right flank, are six undersluices fitted with stony sluice gates each 50 feet in span and 12 feet high. On the right flank of the undersluices and at right angles to the line of the weir is the regulator as since modified owing to the wishes of the Hindu community, the head bridge which consists of ten spans of 20 feet each. The head bridge allows supplies to pass into the new supply channel which connects with the old one just above the town of Hardwar.

The works were all built in open founds and are founded on kankar lime concrete. The superstructure is built in kankar lime boulder masonry faced with hammer-dressed boulders cement pointed except in portions of the work exposed to exceptional wear, which were faced with Bundelkhand granite.

The weir crest, which is seven feet above the undersluice floor, is fitted with falling shutters five feet high. These by means of clips attached to their back struts, can be dropped singly or in flights at will. The undersluice gates are capable of a total lift of 30' 6" which gives them a free bound of 8' 6" above highest flood level when they are fully lifted. two works, weir and undersluices, are capable of passing a discharge of 510,000 cusees maximum flood level and all works have been built with a free board of six feet over this maximum flood level. The left bank of the weir is bounded by a high escarpment and the weir on this side needed no training works with the exception of a short length of embankment to tie the left flank of weir into this escarpment. On the right bank however lie the supply channel of the canal, the town of Hardwar, and the road and railway running to Dehra Dun. These had to be protected as well as the right flank of the works and for this purpose heavy marginal embankments have been constructed running from a point of half a mile below the new works to a point two and a quarter miles above. The total amount of work entailed in the construction of the new works was earthwork 286 lakhs c. ft. concrete 15.5 lakhs cft. masonry 12 lakhs c. ft. and granite flooring 3.75 lakhs c. ft. By far the greater portion of the concrete and masonry works being below the spring level of the river bed after the surface flow had been diverted into the canal.

CONSTRUCTION.

The regulator was the first of the masonry works to be taken in hand, the first concrete in foundations being laid towards the end of the working season of 1913-14. The undersluice foundations were started the next season, both these works necessitating a large amount of excavation through heavy shingle and boulders. Work on the weir was started in 1916, by which time the regulator was nearing completion and all the deepest foundations of the undersluices had been got in, so that pumps could be spared for this part of the work. Work had been proceeding smoothly up to this point, with the exception of a severe cholera epidemic in 1915, but hampered greatly by the difficulty in obtaining materials, owing to the war and by the locality in which the works are situated and the conditions under which it was necessary to work.

Bhimgoda is situated at the point where the Ganges debouches on to the plains through a gorge in the Siwalik Hills. The site of the works is surrounded on three sides by practically uninhabitated jungle, and labour for construction purposes was therefore a serious problem.

The headworks are situated across the main bed of the Ganges and each year it was necessary to divert the river into the canal by means of the temporary dams and lay down the light railway lines and plant before work proper could be proceeded with. These considerations were especially cogent as regards the weir where the flood discharge of the river had to be passed over the uncompleted work, leaving deposits of shingle and silt which had to be removed before work could be restarted each season.

Consideration of these factors made it necessary to employ all mechanical labour-saving devices possible. Investigation

proved that not only would electricity allow of the greatest portability in the type of plant employed but that it would also be the most economical. A convenient source of power was at band at Bahadarabad at mile 7 of the canal where a fall of 19 feet could be obtained by combining two canal falls. Here a Power House was erected, installed with three 150 K. W. alternators driven by low pressure vertical shaft turbines and the power transmitted to the works at a pressure of 10,000 volts where it was transformed down to a working pressure of 500 volts.

The hydro-electric scheme has more than justified itself in spite of its heavy initial cost. The case and facility with which pumps and machines could be set to work where wanted and moved when necessary has been of mestimable advantage. The war had largely increased this justification, as had the works been dependent on coal or oil for power, it would have been probably necessary to close down for considerable periods owing to lack of these materials and would have led in any case to a very great increase in cost owing to the rise in prices of coal and oil.

The total amount of electrical energy consumed during the course of construction amounted to 2,494,470 units which at a rate of 12 annas per unit amounts to Rs. 3,11,808. The indirect benefits in having energy always at command when and where required on a work of this kind are also of very great value.

It has been mentioned that the work proceeded with comparative smoothness up to 1916 when a factor made itself felt which does not often affect canal works.

The Ganges is the most sacred river in India. Hindus of all castes and conditions of life, and in all parts of the country, hold it in deep veneration and regard it as the most sacred of all rivers. Although the whole river is regarded as sacred, a special sanctity applies to Hardwar for it is here that the Harki-pairi, the most sacred of the bathing places of Hindus, is situated.

The change in the existing regime, which had been instituted in 1854 by Col. Sir Proby Cautley, caused the Hindus considerable anxiety on two main grounds—one that the flow of free unfettered water past the Hardwar bathing places would be interfered with, and the other that the flow of the Ganges down

its main bed towards the sea would be completely stopped and the total discharge of the river, including the quantity which had formerly percolated through the temporary dams, turned into the canal.

Views regarding these two questions were widely ventilated in the press and from platforms and representations were made to both the Provincial and Imperial Governments. Meston, then Lieutenant-Governor of these provinces, met some representative Hindu gentlemen at Hardwar in 1914 and it was then decided that to remove all anxiety as regards the Hardwar bathing places, supply channel no. 1 should remain an open channel as it had been previously, and that the channel leading from the new works should have neither "the name nor the appearance of a canal." It afterwards transpired, two years later that the Regulator was the item in the headworks that Hindus most strongly objected to, and this wording was therefore somewhat unfortunate, as the intention was that the channel should have neither pitched slopes nor dressed banks but should have sluices at its head as originally designed. It was further decided that a small gap should be left in the weir in order to allow of a free flow past the works at all seasons of the year.

In 1916 by which time the regulator was nearing completion matters again reached a climax, as the works were causing even increasing alarm and anxiety to the Hindus. Lord Meston accordingly again called a very representative meeting of Hindu gentlemen to discuss and decide upon the matter. He was assisted in this conference by a number of the principal Hindu Ruling Princes of India, and a means was found of not only completely satisfying Hindu sentiment but also of preserving the works, with their usefulness only slightly impaired.

The terms of the settlement arrived at are given in the General Administration Department no. 1002, dated the 28th April, 1917, and are published in part VIII of the *United Provinces Gazette*, dated 5th, May 1917. They lay down that a minimum supply of 1,000 cusees down supply channel no. 1 is guaranteed at all seasons of the year, except during the time of shoal clearances, that the opening of supply channel no. 1 will be left

exactly as it is, unless experience proves that this is dangerous when its width may be reduced, that the head of the new supply channel should not be fitted with gates but shall take the form of a head-bridge with such bays as are left to be open, permanently open, and such as are to remain closed by masonry. This is provided, however, that grooves should be left in the open bays so that they could be blocked by means of wooden sleepers, should imminent danger to Hardwar or to the canal works lower down require this, and that a free opening should be left in the weir which would go down to floor level and that this opening should give a discharge of 400 cusecs at the cold weather low level of the river.

The provision as regards the head of the new supply channel somewhat radically altered the design of the Headworks, but in the particular conditions at Hardwar where the new headworks feed, not into the canal direct but into a supply channel upon which the head of the canal is situated and which is provided with ample escape power, it is hoped that the change will not lead to any great impairment of their usefulness. The greatest danger to be feared is the flood discharge into the new supply channel carrying along with it larger quantities of boulders and shingle to be deposited lower down, thereby blocking the flow of the low river supplies into the canal.

The changes in the design entailed pulling down a large part of the regulator and rebuilding it in conformity with the new conditions. They also entailed the raising of the weir crest by 2 feet in order to give better command.

After these issues had been decided, work was pushed on in the face of steadily increasing difficulties owing to the war and other causes. An epidemic of influenza swept the country with terrible virulence in 1918, and caused a decrease in the available labour force, which is felt to the present day. The working scason on the weir especially, was confined to five months, January to May, out of the 12, and of these April, hardly counted owing to the crop-cutting which, in favourable years takes every available man, woman, and child.

CATTLE CENSUS.

The last stock census was taken in 1327 fashi (1919-20) and previous to that in 1322 fashi (1914-15). In the last census the

number of bulls and bullocks and of male buffaloes was 225,532, showing an average of 2.7 per plough. Thus it would appear that the average per plough at the last stock census (1919-20) has been the same as in 1914-15. The decrease in the figures of cattle census of 1920 as compared with those of 1915, was as follows:—

The above figures show a total decrease of 6 per cent. among all kinds of cattle, while the decrease in the total cropped area of the district since the cattle of census of 1915 has been 10 per cent.

The number of horses, ponies, and mules has fallen from 17,512 in the stock-taking of 1914-15 to 15,927 in that of 1919-20. The slight decrease all round is apparently due to army requisition during the Great War and scarcity of fodder during the period intervening between the last two censuses.

The number of young stock shows also a considerable decrease, as shown below:—

There has also been a marked decrease in the number of carts in the last census. The figures were 27,823 compared with 29.351 in 1914-15.

The number of sheep and goats has been falling steadily for the last 12 years. In 1908-09 it was 102,355, in 1914-15, 87,217 and 81,701 at the last census.

LEADING LAND OWNERS.

There have been very few changes since 1916. Lalas Dharam Das and Sumer Chand, sons of Lala Shambhu Nath, late Honorary Magistrate and Municipal Commissioner, have both died. The property is subject of litigation on the basis of a will alleged to have been executed by Lala Dharam Das in favour of his mother. Action is also being taken with a view to taking the estate under Court of Wards management.

Sheikh Sultan Ahmad, son of the late Hakim Mohammad Yusuf, has recently been made a Khan Bahadur. He is also an Honorary Magistrate; his son is Sheikh Qurban Ahmad.

Khan Saheb Mohammad Naim Khan has been made a Khan Bahadur, and is still working as 1st class Honorary Magistrate.

The Patchar family is now represented by a boy, Sahebzada Nurul Rahman Khan, under the guardianship of his mother, Bibi Ahmadi Begum. He is being educated at Aligarh.

Lala Janeshwar Das, son of the late Lala Paras Das, as an Honorary Magistrate and Honorary Assistant Collector, and has recently been created a Rai Bahadur. His elder brother, Lala Badri Das, is dead.

Lala Deep Chand is the adopted scn of Lala Uggar Sen, whose widow, Musammat Gomti Kunwar, is still alive.

Lala Joti Prasad, son of Lala Bansi Lal of Jagadhri, in the Ambala district, was created a Rai Bahadur and the title of Raja has recently been conferred on him. His son, Kunwar Kishori Saran, continues to act as resident-proprietor of the Canal Foundry and Engineering works at Roorkee.

THE BOTANICAL GARDENS.

Although not originally intended to be a profitable undertaking from a commercial point of view, the gardens have for some years yielded a substantial revenue and in 1906-07 there was an actual profit on the year's working. This has, however, not been general owing to the large amount of time and money expended in recent years on experimental and ornamental work, which in itself is not financially profitable. Government in 1922 issued orders to the effect that such work should cease and that the gardens, as soon as possible, be made self-supporting. Mr. R. Badgery, the present Superintendent, is taking steps to carry out the new policy and little attention will in future be paid to ornamental work or to the growing of any plant not likely to yield a profit to Government. A scheme is also under consideration for the training of Indians with a view to enable them to take over charge, in due course, of Government and other public gardens in India.

EXCISE.

The contract supply system remained in force. The Saharanpur Co-operative Company, Limited, has been supplying the

spirit to the districts of Bijnor, Garhwal, Muzaffarnagar, and Saharanpur. The bonded warehouse at Roorkee continued.

The average annual receipts from the country spirit during the last five years have been Rs. 2,82,076, while annual consumption averaged 30,034 gallons. The present fixed retail price of 35 U P. Country liquor (the only strength issued in this district now) is Rs. 13-8-0 per gallon both in the city and the rural area. Hemp drugs contracts have so far been sold Tahsilwar. The duty on charas and bhang has been increased to Rs. 30 and Rs. 20 per seer respectively since 1st April. 1921. The average consumption of charas during the last five years has been 31 maunds 32 seers annually and the average receipts Rs. 53,516. The duty on opium was gradually increased in the past few years and has been fixed at Rs. 37 from the 1st April, 1922. The average consumption of opium during the last five years has been 35 maunds 30 seers. One more Excise Inspector has been added to the Distillery staff from 23rd February, 1920. The number of Excise Inspectors on preventive duty has now been reduced to three from the 25th May, 1921. The chief feature in the last three years has been the anti-liquor movement which was in its full swing during the year 1921-22, and a substantial remission in the revenue demand was allowed.

The old auction system has been replaced by the surcharge fixed-fee system with effect from the 1st April, 1922, which will place the Excise Revenue on a firm footing, as it has insured profit to contractors even in adverse circumstances.

Cocaine smuggling in the city has again revived and a number of prosecutions have been launched with varying degrees of success.

The system of Excise Administration has since undergone a radical change, based on democratic principles.

A licensing Board has been appointed for the Saharanpur Municipal Area, and has been invested with powers to decide the location, number, etc., of all excise shops within its jurisdiction, and to select licensees for them. Pandit Brij Bhushan Lal, Rais and Honorary Magistrate, is the president of the Board, the Assistant Excise Commissioner being the ex-officio Secretary.

Besides, four Advisory Committees have been constituted with non-official Chairman. Their duties are limited to making suggestions on the various subjects connected with the Excise Administration within their jurisdiction. The Excise Officer of the district is ex-officio Secretary of all these Advisory Committees, which are—

The District Committee performs its functions in respect of the whole of the district, while the other three committees do the same within the respective municipal areas.

STAMPS.

The average receipts from stamps Judicial and otherwise during the last five years have been Rs. 3,93,401 as against an average of Rs. 3,26,288 in the previous five years. The income during the last three years averaged Rs. 4,11,524.

The average income from court-fee and copy stamps amounted to Rs. 3,16,160 during the last five years. There has been a gradual increase under court-fee and non-judicial stamps in each of the years from 1917-18 to 1921-22, which is apparently due to increased litigation owing to bad harvests and to the general increase in the prices of food-stuffs, which had compelled people to borrow. There has been no sale of water-marked paper during the last five years. However, in order to bring about uniformity and discourage the public from resorting to flimsy paper, its extended use is being emphasised by all courts. There has been no sale of Hundi stamps during the last five years, and their use has practically ceased here.

INCOME-TAX.

During the last five years ending 1920-21, the average receipts from income tax amounted to Rs. 84,325. The average number of assessees of over Rs. 2,000 was 558 and average amount of their tax was Rs. 70,350.

Persons with incomes over Rs. 2,000 paid on an average Rs. 562 each annually. In 1918-19 in Saharanpur city alone

there were 176 assessees of over Rs. 2,000 paying tax amounting to Rs. 24,666. The city figures for later years are not available, as the practice of keeping them has been discontinued.

CENSUS, 1921.

The aggregate population of the district in the census of 1921 was 937,471, compared with 986,359 in 1911, and 1,045,230 in 1901. Thus, compared with the figure of the last census (1911) there has been a total decrease of 48,888.

The mean density in 1921 was 513 per square mile, while in 1911 it was 462. The increase in the mean density in spite of the decrease in the total population is due to the fact that the total area of the district in 1921 was 1,168,688 acres or 1,826 square miles.

The percentage of births was 3.74 in 1921 compared with 3.9 in 1911. The death-rate in 1921 was 3.98 compared with 3.72 in 1911.

The increased density of population per square mile in Roorkee is in a large measure obviously due to numerous pilgrims from all parts of India permanently settling in and around Hardwar year by year.

HEALTH AND DISEASE.

The most remarkable feature of the period 1916-21 was the great epidemic of influenza in 1918 in consequence of which the deaths from fevers rose to 74,685, about half of which may be attributed to this disease. The highest incidence of cholera was in 1921 the year of the Adhkumbhi fair in Hardwar; in this district most of the cholera is traceable to infection brought by pilgrims.

Plague after decreasing steadily for some years entirely ceased in 1919 with the exception of two cases in April, 1922—probably imported.

DISPENSARIES.

No new dispensaries have been opened and that at Bhimgoda was closed in 1920, as the works there were completed in that year.

In addition to the Government and district board dispensaries there are two travelling dispensaries, and there is a public charitable dispensary called the Jain charitable dispensary, which was founded in 1909 by Babu Daya Chand and is open to the poor of all classes. It is supported entirely by voluntary subscriptions, and though not very well housed or situated it is well supplied and is doing very useful work, dealing with over 40,000 attendances yearly.

LEPER ASYLUM.

There is also a leper asylum which is supported jointly by the municipality, the United Provinces Government, and the Mission to Lepers in India. It is under the management of Revd. C. Borup of the American Presbyterian Mission and can accommodate 68 lepers.

EDUCATION.

Since 1916 considerable progress has been made in the direction of the diffusion of education.

In 1921 the following three schools in the district became high schools:—

The Kashi Ram High School, The Islamia High School, Saharanpur.

The Government Chamier Orman High School, Roorkee.

As regards boys' schools there has been noticeable increase both in the number of schools and that of scholars with a corresponding increase in expenditure.

Although no new town schools were opened, the number of scholars in town schools has risen by 152. The expenditure on town schools has risen from Rs. 13,065 in 1916-17 to Rs. 19,442 in 1921-22; 74 new primary schools have come into existence, involving an increase of 3,210 in scholars and Rs. 48,871 in expenditure. There has been an addition of six to the number of aided schools in 1916-17, the number of scholars in them having increased by 278 and the expenditure by Rs. 2,198.

The number of Training schools is the same as it was in the year 1916-17, the number of scholars in them also remaining practically unchanged; but the expenditure has gone up by Rs. 5,023.

On the whole, compared with 1916-17, the number of boys schools has increased by 80, involving an increase of 3,643 among scholars and of Rs. 62,469 in the total expenditure.

As regards girls' schools, although one Primary and one Aided school had to be closed, the number of scholars has increased by 112, while the expenditure has gone up by Rs. 8,282, compared with 1916-17. The girls' school at Chilkana had to be closed through inability to get a mistress, while a model girls' school has been opened at Deoband. Private schools have fallen in number from 49 in 1917 to 32 in 1922 but the number of scholars in them has increased from 507 to 522. Parda system is maintained with regard to the senior girls who are conveyed to and from school in carts, carriages or dolis.

Enhanced expenditure is, in a large measure, due also to the regrading of salaries from April, 1921.

Two night schools for depressed classes exist in the district. Other schools for depressed classes are maintained at Nakur, Saharanpur, and Jawalapur, with 64 scholars. Rs. 482 are spent on these schools annually; 171 students in ordinary schools also come from the depressed classes.

The Town schools of Deoband, Nakur, Manglaur, and Gangoh are in the medical charge of the Sub-Assistant Surgeons

stationed locally, who receive an allowance of Rs. 5 per month from the district board.

Magic lantern demonstrations had to be discontinued for want of funds.

Remissions of fees are granted up to a limit of 15 per cent. of the average attendance to deserving scholars.

Amongst private institutions, the Rishikul near Kankhal and the Gurukul Vidyalaya, together with the Arabic school at Deeband, deserve special mention.

The Principal of the Arabic school is Shamsululama Maulvi Hafiz Muhammad Ahmad. The number of pupils throughout the year was 600. No fees are taken. The term of education for Arabic is eight years and for Persian five.

The number of private schools for boys has increased by six, involving an increase of 535 among scholars.

The S. P. G. Mission still maintains four schools in the Roorkee Sub-division.

NEWSPAPERS.

The Urdu monthlies the Al Qasim, the Al Rashid, and the Al Rishad, have ceased publication since April, 1921.

Of the old papers the Jain Pradip in Urdu and the Gujar Hitkhari in Hindi still remain, while the District Gazette also continues to be published under the auspices of the Local District Board.

Two new Urdu organs, the Gujar Gazette and the Hindi Gazette have come into existence in addition to a Hindi paper, the Namdeo Gazette. These new organs essentially represent the interests of the different communities and do not generally dabble in politics.

THOMASON COLLEGE, ROORKEE.

Major E. W. C. Saudes, D.S.O., M.C., R.E., succeeded Mr. W. G. Wood, C.S.I., in 1921 as Principal.

The textile class was transferred to Cawnpore in 1920. During the same year a complete reorganization scheme was drawn up to fit in with the new requirements of Government under the Reform Scheme and the new policy laid down for the future of the college.

The committee of management was replaced by an advisory council under Government orders comprising—

- 1. The Chief Engineer, Public Works department, Irrigation branch.
- 2. The Chief Engineer, Public Works department, Buildings and Roads branch.
- 3. The Chief Engineer, Oudh and Rohilkhand Railway.
- 4. Director of Public Instruction, United Provinces.
- 5. Director of Industries, United Provinces.
- 6. The Principal of the College.
- 7. A member nominated by the Allahabad University.
- 8. A member nominated by the Upper India Chamber of Commerce.
- A member nominated by the United Provinces Chamber of Commerce.
- 10. A member of the college staff, elected by the Board of Studies.
- 11. A non-official member of the Board of Industries elected by the non-official members.
- 12 and 13. Two non-official members of the Provincial Legislative Council.

The Upper Subordinate, Lower Subordinate, Mechanical and Electrical Engineers' classes as well as the Industrial class have been abolished. The status of the college has been greatly improved, as the Government of India offer the students 10 and 9 vacancies in alternate years in the Indian Service of Engineers.

The prospect of admission to the Imperial Service is a return to the former days when students passed out of the college, and were recruited for the service direct.

The value of the work turned out by the Photographic, Mechanical, and Lithographic departments during the year 1920-21 was over a lakh of rupees. Two new bungalows have been built for Professors. The new Professors of Mathematics, Electrical Engineering, and Sanitary Engineering have still to be appointed.

STALLIONS.

There are now 17 stallions (1922) as against 16 in 1917, but the number of coverings has decreased from 1,152 to 1,078. A bull has also been entertained by the District Board dring the quinquennium.

CATTLE POUNDS.

The number has risen from 30 in 1916-17 to 40 in 1921-22 and the income and expenditure from Rs. 10,905 and Rs. 6,063 to Rs. 15,481 and Rs. 7,165 respectively.

SANITATION.

The expenditure on sanitation in villages was Rs. 2,755 in 1916-17, while in 1921-22 it was Rs. 3,538.

Act II of 1892 has been enforced in 21 villages of tahsils Saharanpur, Deoband, and Nakur. Action is being taken to extend the application of the Act to certain villages in tahsil Roorkee as well.

ROADS.

There has not been very much progress in the way of opening new roads or metalling the existing ones owing to financial stringency. The expenditure by the District Board on "Communication repairs" has increased, however, from Rs. 14,513 to Rs. 45,037 in the last five years, owing to increased cost of labour and materials.

As regards the Provincial Roads there are five of them compared with four in 1916. The Saharanpur-Sarsawah, Road has been completed and extended up to the new Jumna bridge on the way to Ambala. Its length is 14 miles 4 furlongs 505 feet.

The Rurki-Bhagwanpur Road (8 miles) and Behat-Shakumber Devi Road (9 miles 2 furlongs 360 feet) are recent additions to the 2nd class local roads of the district. Another small piece of 6th class road from Garhi Abdullah Khan to Titron (5 furlongs 6 feet) has also been completed.

MUNICIPALITIES.

Since the year 1916 there has been no change in the list of municipalities in this district. Only the Deobard Municipality has since elected a non-official Chairman in 1919-20.

In the Saharanpur Municipality octroi has been abolished from Ist December, 1919, and the terminal and toll taxes were introduced from that date. The new assessment of the tax on the annual value of buildings and lands was brought into effect from 1st October, 1919. Mr. B. R. Bomonji, Barrister-at-law, is the first non-official Chairman of the Board. The number of members remained the same, that is, 12 elected (seven muslim and five non-muslim) and three nominated, exclusive of the Chairman.

The financial position appears to be brighter but will not enable the Board to launch any costly schemes such as that of the drainage of the water-supply, the combined estimate of which amounts to about Rs. 20,00,000. The Board, however, proposes to have electric scheme carried out through a company with engine power-house instead of adopting the hydro-electric scheme on account of its heavy initial costs, though no doubt it would have proved more useful and economical in the long run.

In the Deoband Municipality the grain pit tax and the tax on animals have been abolished from 1st April, 1922, while the taxes, the annual value of the buildings and lands and on special trades, had also to be discontinued from that date owing to general dissatisfaction. Toll tax has been introduced from 1st December, 1921, and the graded tax on professions and trades from 1st June, 1922. It is hoped that these two taxes would help materially in improving the financial condition of the Board. Munshi Muhammad Hashim is the present non official Chairman.

The Sub-divisional Officer, Roorkee, continues to be official Chairman of the Roorkee Municipal Board. The Board have sent up proposals to Government for substitution of the terminal and toll tax in place of the existing tax on circumstances and property. The present taxes are said to be very unpopular with all classes. The question for supply of electricity is still pending before the Government.

The Sub-divisional Officer, Roorkee, is also Chairman of the Hardwar-Union Municipality. Terminal and toll tax was introduced in this municipality as well, in the year 1920-21. There are proposals for the extension of the esplanade North and South, for the reclamation and improvement of open spaces and the building of Dharamshalas for the pilgrims, as well as for the provision of a meat market at Jwalapur. The Roorkee-

Hardwar hydro-electric scheme is still under the consideration of Government.

A strong advisory committee has been appointed by the Government to advise the Union in matters relating to the improvement and expansion of Hardwar. It is hoped that ere long they will be able to show much practical and useful work.

TOWN AREAS.

There has been no change since 1916 in the list of Town Areas in this district.

One noteworthy departure, however, has been the general recognition of the elective principles in place of the old practice of appointing members to serve on the Town Area Panchayats.

Before 1922 there was not a single Town Area in which the majority of members had not to be appointed, but under the rules now in force every member has to be duly elected by the tax-payers, except in Jhabrera where one of three members has still to be appointed by the District Magistrate.

In 1918 the registration of births and deaths within Town Area limits, for which the Police had been responsible, was made over to the respective Panchayats.

The boundaries of all the Town Areas are being revised.

In 1920, the Provident Fund rules applicable to Municipal and District Boards were extended to the employes of Town Areas as well.

POLICE.

Under the reduced allocation, a number of police stations have been deprived of their second officers, while the number of constables posted at each Thana has also, generally speaking, been greatly reduced. The police outposts at Chilkana and Nakur have been abolished, as well as the town outposts at Ambehta, Sarsawa, Titron, Jhabrera, and Nanauta.

THE ADH-KUMBH FAIR.

The importance of the Fair need not be discussed, as the Kumbh and the Adh-Kumbh are the only important fairs which are held at Hardwar alternately every six years.

The Adh-Kumbh Fair took place at Hardwar on the 13th of April, 1921. It was estimated that at least 400,000 pilgrims would attend, but the shopkeepers, the Pandas, and the lodging-house-owners were greatly disappointed owing to the crowd being much below expectations.

The only reasons for the total gathering at the Fair being only about 150,000, were that unfounded rumours had gained currency in the Punjab as to the prevalence in Hardwar of cholera, which, it was said, claimed 100 victims daily. Besides, people were also afraid of the evils of the non-co-operation movement and railway strikes, as they had had very bitter experience at the Mahamaha-Baruni Fair of 1919, when they were held up at Saharanpur and other stations for several days. The North-Western Railway authorities at first refused to run special trains, but subsequently arranged for them.

The permanent accommodation in the existing lodging-houses and dharamshalas in Hardwar is only limited. There is room in them for only about 10,000 pilgrims, and consequently the bulk of the crowd had to seek shelter in open areas, from which all rank vegetation and undergrowth had been removed, at a cost of about Rs. 3,845. The Rori and Belwala islands were also cleaned and marked out in blocks with separate sites for Police, Hospital and Sanitary Camps. Main roads and side-roads were distinctly marked and shops let out along them. No rent was charged from pilgrims. Only the shopkeepers had to pay.

For the convenience of the pilgrims who camped in Rori and Belwala, three bridges were constructed—two at Gaoghat and one at Laltarao. Another small bridge was thrown across Jambughat. All these bridges were constructed by the Canal department at a cost of about Rs. 16,000.

The chief bathing day was 13th April and the auspicious time for bathing 5 a. m., but, as usual, people started to bathe as early as 1 a. m. Gradually the rush increased, with the result that about 6 a. m. the barriers had to be worked until about 9 a. m. Bathing continued the whole day up to 8 o'clock in the evening. In the Har-ki-pairi Pool (Bramh Kund) and over the steps, there was at times a great crush because people would not come out of the pool unless compelled to do so.

Adequate arrangements were made for lighting, road-watering, and water-supply, while a sum of Rs. 53,500 was expended on Sanitation alone, exclusive of about Rs. 10,000 the cost of the Police on sanitary duty.

The Allahabad Sewa Samiti, with which there were about 19 others from Peshawar, Patiala, Najibabad, Saharanpur, etc., did admirable work in the shape of providing comforts to the

pilgrims and assisting the authorities in distributing medical relief and the Police in maintaining order.

The Deputy Sanitary Commissioner and the Superintendent of Police were in charge of the Sanitary and the Police arrangements respectively. The Fair passed off without any accidents or loss of life.

The expenditure was very heavy and the Fair Fund, which opened with a balance of Rs. 97,658, closed with a deficit of Rs. 27,342. The total expenditure thus amounted to Rs. 1,25,000.

DISTRICT EXHIBITION.

There are no records giving a history of the Saharanpur exhibition. The first exhibition in this district is said to have been held as far back as 1878, when Mr. A. J. Sladen (father of Mr. F. F. Sladen, i.c.s.) was Collector. It was held in the Farodgah ground, but when Mr. Harrington revived it in 1883, he selected the present site adjacent to the Botanical Gardens, having found the Farodgah Maidan too small for the purpose. The exhibition was held continually for three years in his time, but was given up in 1886 by his successor, Mr. Irving. Then there was a great break of 27 years, the next exhibition having been held in 1913 by Mr. J. C. Fergusson, I.c.s. (now Commissioner, Northern India Salt Revenue). He invited Sir James (now Lord) Meston, the then Lieutenant-Governor, to perform the opening ceremony of the exhibition. Thereafter the Great War which dislocated all normal life also stood in the way of holding the exhibition. After the termination of the War, however, the exhibition was again held in 1920 by Mr. W. Raw of happy memory. Mr. Silberrad could not see his way to hold it in 1921. The present Collector, Mr. S. M. Habibullah, O.B.E., associated himself with the idea of its revival in 1922 and consequently the exhibition held in that year under the auspices of the local District Board was exceptionally successful owing to the united efforts of the officials and non-officials and the enthusiasm of the public generally.

Both as an industrial exhibition, and a source of recreation. the show held in 1922, was a distinct success. The elaborate manner in which the whole thing had been laid out showed the

amount of interest taken in it by all concerned. The entries in all departments far exceeded expectations.

The Agricultural court, the Ladies court, the Forest court, and the court for country-made articles attracted great attention both owing to the variety and the number of exhibits; while the Poultry show elicited the approbation of Mrs. Fawkes, the Secretary of the United Provinces Poultry Association. The Flowershow was also a great success. The race-course was laid out with the active help of Major Allen of the local Remount Dépôt while the keen interest taken by Mr. R. Badgery, Superintendent, Botanical Gardens, led in a great measure towards converting the grounds into a park. His Highness the Nawab of Rampur had kindly lent his State Band to play during the exhibition week.

The unqualified success of the exhibition and the excellent arrangements were due to the keen interest and guidance of the Collector, Mr. S. M. Habibullah, O.L.E., and the indefatigable efforts of M. Mumtazullah Khan, the General Secretary, and Thakur Hukam Singh, the officer-in-charge, assisted as they were by many zealous workers.

It has been decided to hold the district exhibition again in 1923.

VILLAGE PANCHAYATS.

The United Provinces Village Panchayat Act (Act VI of 1920) was applied to this district in 1921.

The idea of having panchayats in villages was welcomed generally, although it excited suspicion and distrust in some places where the zamindars were afraid of their influence being undermined. The preliminary survey was calculated to promote confidence and clear the atmosphere. Care was taken to select only those villages where the panchayats were likely to thrive The personnel of the panchayats was formed on a representative and elective basis in accordance with the rules.

At the close of the year ending 31st March, 1922, there were 130 panchayats working in the district as follows:—

Before the panchayat started work the Act and the rules as well as the procedure to be adopted were explained to them by the special panchayat officer.

The success of the panchayats will depend mainly on the selection of its members, particularly the sarpanch. Some of the panchayats have been doing brisk work. One of them has decided as many as 88 civil suits. The number of cases decided by some of them is creditable, considering the brief span of their experience. The panchayats have come as a blessing to villages which were far removed from Honorary Munsifs' courts.

There were frequent irregularities in procedure, but rarely, if at all, has there been a miscarriage of justice. Mistakes in procedure are bound to occur as long as the panches are untrained and inexperienced. Frequently the mistakes are due to the fact that the sarpanch tries to be too clever and attempts to use his stray bits of legal knowledge picked up during his visits to the Criminal and Civil Courts. One or two panchayats entertained exaggerated notions of their importance and arrogated to themselves powers, not warranted by the Act. All these defects will disappear gradually by experience. On the whole, the panchayats in the district have worked well.

The number of carts decreased from 25,633 in 1915 to 23,988 in 1920, due to the decrease in the number of bullocks; and the decrease in the number of ploughs from 70,251 to 61,249 was also due to the same cause. It must, however, be remembered that the bullocks employed in this district for carts and ploughs are superior to those further east. It is also a fact that, in this district in some villages, a plough is not supposed to be a right unit unless there are 3 or 4 bullocks to pull it,

whereas further east two bullocks are supposed to be the recognized complement.

The falling off in the number of cows, bulls and bullocks is due to the heavy mortality caused by the scarcity of fodder occasioned by the abnormally deficient rainfall in 1918. Cow buffaloes of this district are much sought after by Punjab dealers and fetch good prices causing a reduction here.

Export of goats during war time was the reason for their decrease as well as those of horses and ponies, mules and asses. Camels are not popular in this district, except to some extent in Kairana tabsil.

Page 20.-FEVER.

1918 was the memorable Influenza year claiming about 28,000 victims in two months time. The first case was reported from Kairana in the first week of October. The disease spread to the surrounding villages. It travelled from west to east and spread throughout the district in an epidemic form. When the reports of high mortality from the district were received an attempt was made to combat it by organizing a system of relief by providing medicines and medical comforts to the general public, more particularly to the poor. The district board contributed about Rs. 200 for medicines required for the treatment of patients. The local Raises also took an active part and afforded great relief to the poor suffering from this disease. Syed Ahmad Hasan, B.A., of Ratheri, treated a large number of patients at his private dispensary with great success by homeopathic method. The number of influenza cases treated in the dispensaries was 21,534.

The first case of Relapsing fever was reported on the 29th March, 1919. There were in all 44 reported cases, and all of them were treated by travelling dispensary.

1920 was an year of Mularia epidemic. By the middle of August it was apparent that it was increasing, and by the 3rd week of August it was raging in epidemic form, and by the middle of October it had reached its climax. It gradually subsided leaving a large number of cases of Malarial Cahexia and enlarged spleen. 1,000 lbs. of residual alkaloids and 100 lbs. of quinine were distributed free.

Plague gave no trouble during the period and was sporadic. Small-pox was reduced to the minimum: deaths from this cause were only 1, 2, 3 in 1921, 1918, 1920, respectively. Cholera claimed 512 and 936 victims in 1917 and 1921.

Page 23.—CATTLE DISEASE.

Out of the four Veterinary dispensaries in the district, the Kairana dispensary has since been moved to Shamli, which 'is a more central place. Inocculation is quite popular now and there has been no serious outbreak of cattle disease.

Page 32.—AGRICULTURE.

An agricultural farm at Muzaffarnagar was opened in August, 1918. The area of the farm is 109 acres and it is situated on the Muzaffarnagar-Meerut road at a distance of about a mile from the town. The farm is not irrigated by canal water. Tube wells are used for the purpose. The farm supplies good wheat and improved sugarcane at market rates and gives advice and assistance to the cultivators.

The experimental farm at Sisoli has been left for private enterprise. Pusa wheat is becoming popular and some awakening is observed amongst the proprietor farmers for tube wells on dry lands.

Page 51. - IRRIGATION.

There is a sort of network of canal irrigation rendering the soil very fertile and thereby giving a good yield. The head-quarters of the Northern division, Ganges Canal, have been removed from Muzaffarnagar to Roorkee.

Total canal irrigated area in 1329 Fasli was 212,050 as compared with 252,021 in 1328 Fasli.

The decrease is almost uniformly marked in all the four tahsils and is due to the excessive rains in 1329 Fasli.

There is a project on foot to reduce irrigation in some places to find more water at Narora due to Hindu sentimentality for sacred bathing there.

There is some awakening amongst the leading zamindars for the introduction of oil engines in their estates, and three such have been installed by the Hon'ble Lala Sukhbir Singh at Muzaffarnagar, Syed Abdulla Khan at Jansath and Syed Muzaffar Ali Khan at Sikandarpur.

Page 52.- WELLS.

Well irrigation has much improved. With the aid of Government, 97 pakka wells were built and 16 were repaired during the period 1917—1922; Rs. 68,705 were advanced for this purpose under Act XIX of 1883 during these years. Mr. Marsh, i.c.s., took personal interest in this advancement.

Page 57.- FAMINE.

No part of the district has ever been declared as famine area, chiefly due to abundant canal irrigation.

Page 60.—TRADE.

The chief wealth of the district consists in its large exports of wheat and sugar. The blanket making industry, which received a great impetus during the war, has been giving work to thousands of weavers and other poorer classes.

A flourishing grain and sugar market has sprung un at Shamli owing to its connection with railway and Marshganj is a well built mandi for their storage.

The mandi at Jalalabad on the same railway line (Shahdara-Saharanpur Railway) did not prove a success perhaps because the place was too isolated.

A new grain market called Marsh-Liaqatganj have been added to Muzaffarnagar mandi by the senior branch of the family of the Nawabs of Karnal.

A new grain mandi is under construction near the railway station and there is a project for building a new platform and a goods-shed for the convenience of the new market.

The district is peculiarly adapted to the manufacture of vinegar on improved lines and kindred industry of preparing chatnies and other pickles as canejuice, mangoes, sugar are to be found in abundance.

Page 63.- WAGES.

The average rates of wages are as follows:—Carpenters: Rs. 30 to Rs. 45 per mensem.

Masons: Rs. 30 to Rs. 45 per mensem.

Thatchers: Rs. 15 to Rs. 25 per mensem.

Bricklayers: Rs. 15 to Rs. 25 per mensem.

The considerable increase in wages of the labouring classes of the district is partly due to the prevalence of high prices generally and partly to social and political inspirations.

There are some proposals for opening branch lines, but owing to the financial stringency they could not be carried out. The proposal to connect Garhmukhtesar with Laksar with stations at Miranpur and Purkazi is still in abeyance.

Page 66. - METALLED BOADS.

The project for metalling Muzaffarnagar-Budhana road is still held up as the District Board has not only to get funds for the purpose but also to provide for the annual upkeep. Budhana is the only tahsil in this district which is not connected with a metalled road. Only 3 miles of it have been done so far.

The proposals to metal six miles from Bhopa to Allahbas has not been sanctioned as yet. Previous remarks about other roads still hold good.

The total population of the district was 794,265 in 1921 as compared with 808,360 in 1911, showing a decrease of 1.7 per cent.

The decrease was more marked in Jansath tahsil.

It was undoubtedly due to the ravages of influenza epidemic. In other respects the births exceeded deaths.

Pages 113 to 115.—KARNAL FAMILY.

The litigation about the property of Nawab Azmat Ali Khan, which ensued on his death, has now ended, with the result that the major portion of the property has been declared as a religious endowment and the rest equally divided among his two brothers.

Nawab Rustam Ali Khan is also dead now and his property is owned by his three sons:—

1. Nawab Muhammad Sajjad Ali Khan and his two younger brothers, Nawabzada Saadat Ali Khan and Liakat Ali Khan.

VAISHAS.

The Hon'ble Lala Sukhbir Singh is the leading gentleman. In 1921 he was appointed a member of the Council of State.

BOHRAS.

The estate of Musammat Parbati and Musammat Sundara which was under the receivership of the District Judge passed on to Saith Behari Lal who has now made an endowment of the same in favour of a National School at Muzaffarnagar.

SAYEDS.

Sayed Asghar Ali Khan of Jansath died and his property devolved on his four sons.

Sayed Ashfaq Husain of Ratheri died leaving his only son, Syed Mubarak Husain, to succeed to his property. Sayed Aiwaz Ali of Tissa also died and his property went to his son and two grandsons.

GUJARS.

Chaudhri Balwant Singh, the adopted son of Rani Dharam Kunwar, continues to hold the estate, portions of which are being sold off to pay off the debts.

JATS.

Rao Bahadur Chaudhri Mamraj Singh is the outstanding man now of this community. His recruiting services during the war were recognized by the bestowal of the title of Rao Bahadur and a remission of land revenue amounting to Rs. 418-3-10 during his lifetime.

Chaudhri Sukhbir Singh of Maulaheri family died a few months ago.

RAJPUTS (MUSALMANS).

Rao Maqsud Ali Khan, who was also an Honorary Magistrate, has died leaving three sons behind him.

RAJPUTS (HINDUS).

Rao Bahadur Chaudhri Ghansham Singh earned a title for services during the war. He has been granted a lifetime remission of land revenue amounting to Rs. 502-8-6.

Page 133.—DISTRICT STAFF.

The additional subordinate judge, whose appointment was sanctioned under the Greeven's scheme, now holds his court at Muzaffarnagar. There is a project for the construction of his court house, but for the present a private bungalow near the railway station has been taken on three years' lease for the same.

The removal of Kairana Munsif's court to Muzaffarnagar is also under contemplation.

A new Honorary Magistrate's court has been opened at Ratheri with Syed Ahmad Hasan, B.A., as the presiding officer with 2nd class powers. Rao Usman Ali Khan has taken the place of Rao Maqsud Ali Khan, deceased, as special Magistrate at Kairi.

Five new Honorary Assistant Collectors hold their courts at Purkazi, Shamli, Jansath and Muzaffarnagar, thus:—

- (1) Lala Mangat Rai, retired Canal Deputy Magistrate at Purkazi.
- (2) Rao Bahadur Chaudhri Mamraj Singh, zamindar at Shamli.
- (3) Syed Muzaffar Ali Khan, zamindar (Jansath).
- (4) Lala Murli Dhar, zamindar (Jansath).
- (5) Munshi Muhammad Abdullah, retired Canal Deputy Magistrate at Muzaffarnagar.

With the establishment of village panchayats the post of the village Munsifs have been abolished.

The number of village panchayats are as follows:—Tahsil Muzaffarnagar 50, Jansath 8, Kairana 55, and Budhana 33.

The above panchayats were constituted under Act VI of 1920 with effect from the 28th August, 1921 in this district. Some of them performed useful work, but a great deal depended upon its personnel. They were still in an experimental stage, but augered well for future.

One of the Deputy Collectors is the panchayat officer to help the District Officer in watching their work.

Page 147.—Police Arrangement and force.

In view of the retrenchment scheme many reductions have been made during the year 1922-23, and the allocation of the police force at present is as follows:—

The following outposts have also been abolished during 1922-23:—

There is no town police now.

There has been an increase in their pay, and accommodation in some thanas has been improved.

The project of building a house for the Superintendent of Police has been sanctioned by Government and construction will commence as soon as funds are available.

Page 152.—Excise.

The ordinary distillery system was replaced by what is known as contract distillery with effect from 1st April, 1909. A bonded warehouse is established at Muzaffarnagar, the one at Kairana was closed from 1st April, 1923. Spirit is sent under bond from distillery at Saharanpur to the bonded warehouse in this district and thence issued to retail vendors on payment of duty and price.

From 1st April, 1921 the duty on country spirit for the whole district is Rs. 6-12 and the contract price Rs. 1-9-6 per 35 U. P. gallon. Only 35 U. P. liquor is issued to all shops in the district; the strength of 25 U. P. has been done away with.

From 1st April, 1921 Government has introduced in the district the graduated surcharge system of letting out the shops. Instead of shops being auctioned or given to approved men by selection, the current holders of existing licences received a sympathetic consideration at the time of annual renewal of licences of late years. There has been a further considerable reduction in the number of country liquor shops. There are now only 47 shops throughout the district. Under the new system the incidence of licence fee per gallon or seer is not uniform, but increases at intervals so that the profits of the vendors are not proportionate to his sales. The price of retail sale has also been fixed at Rs. 13-8-0 per gallon of 35 U. P.

Ориим.

There are 26 opium shops in the district. These shops are also let out on the graduated surcharge system. The treasury price has gradually been raised annually and is now Rs. 70 per seer from 1st April, 1922. The sale price has been fixed at Rs. 120 per seer from the same date.

HEMP DRUGS.

Charas and bhang are the only drugs consumed in the district. Bhang grows spontaneously and is transported to other

districts also. The transport duty on charas has been raised to Rs. 35 per seer from 1st April, 1922. Prior to 1922-23 the contract was given for the whole district in smaller contracts of one tahsil over each. From 1922-23 the system of shop to shop settlement for drugs was introduced under the new graduated surcharge system and the contract for supply was given to one man on tender. Bonded warehouses for liquor at Kairana and Muzaffarnagar were made drugs warehouse also and the retails vendors got issues thence on payment of the price and duty. The new system led to the elimination of capitalists.

GENERAL (EXCISE).

From 1st April, 1923 the excise staff has been reduced from three Excise Inspectors and six peons to two Excise Inspectors and four peons. With a view to promote co-operation between the police and the excise staff yearly conferences are held at the headquarters of the district where matters relating to excise are discussed.

There are advisory committees for Kairana and Muzaffarnagar towns and one ordinary committee for the whole district for advising the Collector on matters connected with excise.

The hours of sale have been curtailed. In municipal towns the hours are 12 noon to 7 p.m. and in rural tracts the hours are 12 noon to sunset.

Page 153.—MUNICIPALITIES.

Kandhla has now been converted into a notified area.

With effect from 8th May, 1922 house-tax in Muzaffarnagar municipality has been superseded by terminal-tax which yields greater income and in Kairana a toll-tax was introduced with effect from 18th February, 1923 and yielded an income of Rs. 1,029 in the year 1922-23.

The number of towns is the same as before. They are governed now under Town Area Act II of 1914 from 1st April, 1916.

Page 153.—DISTRICT BOARD.

The District Board has now been given a non-official chairman from 1st April, 1923.

There are nine Muslim and 22 non-Muslim members elected by a popular electorate. Besides these there are two non-official

nominated members by Government making a total of 33 members altogether. The non-official elected Chairman is Rao Bahadur Chaudhri Gansham Singh:—

Page 153.—Schools.

The Matriculation class of the Edward Anglo-Sanskrit High School has been replaced by School Leaving Certificate Class. A promising institution, the D. A. V. High School has also been opened by private enterprise with Government aid to supplement it.

There is also a national school but its financial condition is not very bright.

A Normal School has also been opened near the Government High School from July, 1923, for training of the Vernacular School Teachers. At present there are 106 pupil teachers with a staff of 6 assistant teachers, one Headmaster and Drill Master besides a clerk.

It is a residential institution and each pupil teacher gets an stipend of Rs. 13 a month.

A model Vernacular School with 120 boys and a staff of one Headmaster and one Drill Master has also been attached to the Normal School situated in the same compound. Following is the list of various other schools of the district:—

DISPENSABIES.

A charitable dispensary was opened at Muzaffarnagar near the tabsil building on 16th May, 1920, called Rambilas Charitable Dispensary. Lala Rambilas of Bhewani bore the whole cost of construction of the building amounting to Rs. 25,000 and the running expenses are also borne by the same gentleman.

The daily average attendance of outdoor patients during the year ending 31st March, 1923 was 104.

This dispensary is under the charge of a Sub-Assistant Surgeon Lala Rugh Nath Prasad Sikri, L.M.P., assisted by three compounders.

The travelling dispensary still continues to do useful work.

OTHER CHARITABLE WORKS.

- 1. A pakka ghat, a well and a temple have been constructed on the left bank of the Kali Nadi through the generosity of Rai Sahib Lala Jagdish Prasad who spent about Rs. 7,000 over them.
- 2. A dharamshala has been opened on the Muzaffarnagar-Shamli road inside the town by Musammat Asharfi Devi, widow of Lala Lakshmi Narayan Khattri, late Honorary Magistrate of Shamli. The total cost incurred by the said lady is estimated at about Rs. 20,000.
- 3. Saith Bihari Lal (Bhora) has made an endowment of his property in favour of a National School, Muzaffarnagar, which has yet to be built.

SETTLEMENT.

The district was under settlement operations during the period 1918-1921. The comprehensive settlement report written by Mr. H. A. Lane, 1.C.s., contains valuable information.

From the said report it is clear that the cultivation has become more extensive as well as intensive and the more valuable crops are growing in popularity.

In 1917 His Excellency the Governor at a Meerut Durbar declared that all enhancements of revenue which would otherwise have resulted from the settlement would be remitted during their lifetime to proprietors who themselves went or sent their relatives on service in the Great War. In accordance

with that declaration 105 landholders received remissions during the said settlement.

It was Rs. 12,49,222 in the Settlement of 1892, and Rs. 20,27,002 in the Settlement of 1922.

The increase comes to 62.2 per cent. and indicates the agricultural prosperity which the district had attained. The occupancy rent has increased from Rs. 12,44,227 to Rs. 14,04,655 or 1.29 per cent. only.

In 1918 the area cultivated was 74,000 acres less and the new fallow 71,000 acres greater than the corresponding figures at the previous settlement. The decrease in the area cultivated was due to the drought of that year (1918).

The area under the plough naturally spreads with the rise in the price of grain and the breaking up of inferior areas becomes remunerative.

The construction of the Shahdara-Saharanpur Light Railway has been an important factor opening up the Kairana tahsil where much of the expansion has taken place. The live stock of the district is of a good type.

The Jat loves a fine bullock as much as the Gujar a good she buffaloe.

THE DISTRICT'S CONTRIBUTION TO THE GREAT WAR, RECRUITING.

Nine thousand five hundred and ninety-seven men of this district offered themselves for enlistment for the Great War.

These do not include the persons belonging to this district who were enrolled from other districts.

The Jats and the Rajputs produced the largest number of combatants and the Chamars and sweepers scored the highest as non-combatants.

Besides the above the district supplied 2,702 recruits for the Afghan campaign 1919-21. Out of this 351 as combatants and 1,498 as non-combatants were accepted by the Recruiting Officer, Delhi. The District obtained the third place in the matter of recruitment as well as in the War Loan in the Meerut division, but if the population was taken into consideration it was the first in the same.

The Gujars of the district also provided their quota in the matter of recruitment but the other fighting classes of the district greatly missed the golden opportunity.

Rai Bahadur Chaudhri Mamraj Singh of Shamli and Rai Bahadur Chaudhri Ghansham Singh were the recipients of their titles for the good work in that connection. A portion of their land revenue paid by them was also remitted by Government for their lifetime. Several other leading Raises of the district received rewards in the form of sanads and guns and other presents besides officials.

WAR LOAN AND OUR DAY.

Rupees 40,08,675 were contributed towards the "War Loan, mostly by the rich classes of the district. These figures did not include sums below Rs. 50 subscribed by small contributions.

Rupees 8,127 were contributed to the Our Day Fund, which sum also did not include contributions below Rs. 50 nor those subscribed in considerable amount towards the Red Cross and other Relief Funds for which no authenticated record for all agencies was kept

REFORMS.

With the introduction of the reform councils this district has been made a separate constituency returning one Muslim and one non-Muslim member to the Provincial Legislative Council. There was not brisk competition at the last election of 1920.

Khan Bahadur M. Inayat Ali Khan secured the Muhammadan seat, easily while Pandit Hirdey Nath Kunzru of Allahabad was the chosen non-Muslim member. There was 22 polling stations for the non-Muslims and 9 for Muslims as follows:—

ALLAHABAD:

QUININE POWDERS.

No quinine powders were distributed during the years in review by tahsildars, zamindars, patwaris or stamp vendors as there have only been two travelling dispensaries working in the district, it seems as if good results could be obtained by distributing quinine to officials and men of standing. The deaths from malaria in a healthy year like 1921-22 were such an enormous proportion of the total deaths that it looks as if action of this kind would prove beneficial.

WELLS.

Little progress has been made since 1912-13 with the construction of tube wells as only two wells have been sunk. But there has been considerable activity in the construction of masonry wells, 1,026 being constructed by means of takavi advances under Act XIX of 1883. Most of these were made in the Hapur tahsil where there is little irrigation.

ROADS.

There is nothing of great importance to be said about the roads except that on the whole their condition seems to become steadily worse. The Meerut-Mowana road has been nearly impassable for the last three years and its condition has not been improved by the establishment of a motor bus system.

The District Board road from Sikhera-Kutchesar has been metalled for a distance of 4 miles. A revised list of roads is appended.

CENSUS.

The population in 1911 was 1,519,364 and in 1920, 1,499,074, a decrease of 20,296. This decrease is considerable and must be largely attributed to the influenza epidemic of 1918, although it is possible that the wastage due to the War also contributed to it. The vital statistics from 1912 to 1917 show a steady increase in the number of births and with the exception of 1913 a decrease in the number of deaths but in 1918 the rate per 1,000 in the number of deaths rose from 28 to 87 and in 1918 the rate per 1,000 in the number of births fell from 47 to 40 and in 1919 to 35.

These statistics continue to show a considerable preponderance of male to female births every year.

LEADING MEN.

We have to note with great regret the death of Nawab Asadullah Khan, Khan Bahadur, of Meerut in 1921. The Khan Bahadur was one of the best known and most respected men in the division and his services to Government and to every form of public service will always be remembered.

He has been succeeded by his brother Nawab Saif-ullah Khan who is devoting his leisure, earned in retirement from Government service, to the municipal board and other branches of public life.

Muhammad Jamshed Ali Khan of Baghpat has been given the title of Nawab and been made an Honorary Lieutenant and Honorary A D. C. to His Excellency the Governor.

Nawab Saiyid Ahmad Shah of Sardhana died in 1921 full of years and honours. His death has made a great gap among the landed gentry of the district.

PRESS AND NEWSPAPERS.

There has been an increase in the number of presses from 34 to 44 since 1911. Of these 38 are in the city and 6 in Cantonments. On the other hand there has been a decrease in the number of newspapers from 29 to 21 and the District Gazette which used to be published fortuightly has been abolished.

SOCIETIES.

There are above 120 societies in the district, the most important of which are detailed below:—

- (1) The Vaish Maha Sabha was established in 1894. There are about 250 members. It supports a Vaish orphanage which is prospering. There are 102 orphans who are given free education, food and lodging. It is a registered body.
- (2) The Rajbans Vaish Agarwal Sabha is also a registered body with about 80 members. It was established in 1897.
- (3) The U. P. Maha Sabha Mandal is a body of the Sanatan Dharam Samajists and was established in 1915.

 There are about 1,000 members, paid lecturers are deputed to preach the orthodox Hindu religion and to

work against the influence of other religions. This Sabha also looks after Hindu temples. All the Sanatan Dharam Sabhas of the province work under this mandal.

(4) The Muslim League district branch which was established in 1909 has now been merged into the Khilafat Committee and has become more prominent in the last few years. There are about, 12 Goshalas in the district whose aim is to save cattle from slaughter. The said Manjil Club no longer exists but the Jubilee Club which occupies a portion of the Town Hall is in a flourishing state and has presumably taken over some of the functions of the said Manjil Club.

Rai Sahib Pandit Sita Ram, M.L.C., is president of the Boys' Scouts Association which is affiliated to the Imperial Boys' Scouts Association, whose objects are well known throughout the Empire. The Rai Sahib has also taken over the presidency of several other associations whose aim is to render assistance during fairs and epidemics.

The Congress Committee is new but its aims are too well known to need recapitulation here.

LIBRARY AND EDUCATION.

The new facts about library have not yet been received from the Census office.

The Shambhu Dayal High School at Ghaziabad was established 2 or 3 years ago and the buildings for the Faiz-i-am High School and the Deonagri High School in Meerut are complete.

At Earout the Jat Vedic High School was opened 2 or 3 years ago.

The number of Primary and Preparatory Schools has risen from 299 in 1916 to 560 in 1922 and that of Secondary Vernacular Schools from 10 to 24.

There has been a great increase in enrolment from 16,075 to 35,971. New school buildings have been ercoted at Parichatgarh, Begamabad, Daula, Daha, Ghaziabad and Mowana.

The facts and figures show a great improvement in the educational facilities of the district.

ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS.

EXCISE.

The policy of Government is to reduce the number of shops and increase the duty with the hope of restricting consumption. In each municipality there is an advisory committee which considers the number and location of shops and advises the abolition of those which are unnecessary.

The number of country liquor shops fell from 104 in 1909 to 76 in 1920 and the revenue derived was about 4 lakh greater than in 1907-03.

The figures of the average receipts from opium and charas and of the average consumption of these drugs are given in the list of tables. It will be seen that the prosperity of the district has been maintained as the total receipts have uniformally increased though the number of shops has declined. It would appear that the consumption of opium is decreasing while that of country liquor and charas is increasing. Since 1922 the auction system has been replaced by the graduated surcharge fixed fee system under which the licence fee is realized monthly in arrears according to the prescribed scale.

LOCAL SELF-GOVERNMENT.

The introduction of the new Municipality Act (Act II of 1916) has brought many changes in the Municipal Administration. There are now four Municipalities (Meerut, Hapur, Ghaziabad, Barout), three Notified Areas (Mowana, Sardhana and Pilkhua) and sixteen Town Areas.

The Municipalities and Notified Areas elect their Boards and Officers while the Town Areas are administered by panchayats established by the District Magistrate on the recommendation of the Sub-divisional officers.

Meerut.— Octroi and tax on houses are the financial taxes. The big schemes of hydro-electric lighting and drainage had to be postponed owing to financial stringency.

Ghaziabad.—A toll tax has taken the place of certain direct taxes which were found to be inadequate for this purpose.

Hapur.—The octroi system is the chief source of income. The free ganj proved to be a total failure.

Barout.—A tax on circumstances and house property is in force. As the municipality was unable to carry out the drainage scheme, the money borrowed from Government for the purpose had to be refunded.

DISTRICT BOARD.

The financial stringency of the years following the war has had its effect on the activities of the District Board, but through careful management the Board was able to carry on without a deficit till the year 1923-24.

No new work of importance have been undertaken with the exception of educational buildings which are noted elsewhere. The urgent necessity of remetalling the more important roads has diverted a great deal of money and has prevented the building of a first class dispensary at Hapur.

The election under the new Act were held in April, 1923 and for the first time the District Board has now got a non-official chairman.

HARVEST.

1915-16.

The feature of the monsoon of 1915 was the very uneven distribution of the rainfall during the month of June, insufficient rain was received for agricultural operations. In July and August the rainfall was below the normal. In September copious rain was received. Harvests were satisfactory and prices high. The year was a prosperous one for cultivators and labourers.

1916-17.

This year was again one of heavy rain, but unlike the previous year, the rainfall was well distributed over the whole of the district. The first advance in the monsoon occurred during the 2nd week of June, several days before the usual date and resulted in fairly widespread rainfall. Taking the monsoon period as a whole, it may be said that it commenced earlier and lasted later than usual. There was every where ample rainfall for kharif sowings but the continuance of the wet and cloudy weather which was almost unbroken throughout July, August, and part of September was not favourable to all classes of crops Cotton, maize and juar suffered. The outturn of juar, baira was 13 annas; cotton 12 annas and that of maize 14 annas. The outturn of sugarcane was normal. On the whole, the rabi was very satisfactory in point of quantity but damage was done to the grain on the threshing floor by the unusual weather in May. Taking the year as a whole it must be recorded as a satisfactory one.

1917-18.

The monsoon began in excellent time, but was somewhat scanty and badly distributed in the earliest stages and it was not till the second half of July that sufficiently general rain was received to enable the kharif sowings to be completed. From thence on the rainfall was copious and continuous lasting well into October but the heavy storm which marked the closing stages of the monsoon did damage to the cotton which was in flower and also to other crops in low lying land. The excessive rainfall in October also retarded the sowing of rabi. The average outturn of wheat, barley and peas was 14 annas, gram and masur 13 annas, sarson (oil seed) 12 annas.

1918-19.

The monsoon of 19.8 could hardly have been worse. Until the middle of August only local showers were received and no start could be made with the sowing of the coarse crops. Heavy and general rain came in the third week of August and induced the cultivators to sow but their efforts were rendered nugatory by the entire absence of rain after the end of that month. Moreover hot west winds set in from 7th September and withered crops with great rapidity. Nothing was produced in unirrigated lands not even a supply of folder worth mentioning nor was there sufficient moisture in the ground to enable the rabi to be sown without irrigation.

The outturn of kharif crops in irrigated tracts was estimated at 12 annas and in unirrigated tracts from 3 to 8 annas.

1919-20.

The monsoon of 1919 set in the first week of July, but sufficient rain for sowing was not received till the middle of the month. This was late for cotton sowings. Copious rain fell thereafter till 9th September, when dry west winds set in.

The cessation of the rain after the 9th September, was welcomed as a break was needed and crops sown in low lying lands suffered from floodings. The monsoon on the whole was satisfactory. Sugarcane was a very good crop.

1920-21.

The monsoon of 1920 arrived in the third week of June and gave an excellent start to agricultural operations. After the first week of August no more rain was received and strong westerly winds set in and soon dried up the grounds. The monsoon after a most 'promising beginning came to a disappointing end. The outturn of kharif crops is given below:—

The monsoon of 1921 arrived late. Light to moderate rain fell in the month of June and in the first two weeks of July which was not sufficient to give start to the agricultural opera-In the third week of July rain was copious and general. That received in August was continuous and heavy and prevented weeding of crops and damaged crops, especially maize in low lying tracts. The rain received in the first three weeks of September was above the normal. Rabi was sown with a large area and in good time. The yield of the principal kharif crops is given below :-

Additions and Alterations to Part A of the Bulandshahr District Gazetteer bringing it up to date (1924).

Chapter I, page 25.—CATTLE DISEASE.

Cattle disease is no longer very prevalent in this district. The largest number of outbreaks in recent years was in 1917-18, when 10 outbreaks of rinderpest and 16 of septicæmia were reported. The number of deaths from epidemics was largest in 1922-23, when 892 animals died of rinderpest and 77 of septicæmia. Anthrax and foot-and-mouth diseases have not appeared in an epidemic form in recent years. There is now hardly any prejudice against inoculation in this district. Over 12,000 animals have been inoculated in the last seven years.

There are now 4 veterinary hospitals, each in charge of a Veterinary Assistant Surgeon. They are situated at Bulandshahr, Anupshahr, Khurja, and Sikandrabad and have proved to be very useful. The annual cost is about Rs. 5,500 which is entirely met by the District Board.

Chapter I, page 25.—Horse-Breeding.

During the last twenty years the horse-breeding industry has continued to flourish, and the type of brood-mare has further improved. There are now 10 provincial and 10 imperial stallions in this district. The stallion stables are at Bulandshahr, Chirawak, Baroli, Malakpur, and Miana. The management is in the hands of the Army Remount department. The entire cost of stables, feed and keep of provincial stallions (except the pay of jamadar at Bulandshahr) is met by the District Board. The annual cost per provincial stallion is about Rs. 300.

There are now no imperial donkey-stallions in the district and mule-breeding has made no progress.

Chapter I, page 30 .- MEDICAL HISTORY.

The construction of the Prince of Wales Hospital at Bulandshahr in 1924 by the District Board at a cost of Rs. 1,20,000 has provided Bulandshahr with an up-to-date hospital. Its existence and its equipment are in great measure due to the munificence of the wealthy landholders and other leading residents of the

district. The dispensaries at Bulandshahr, Khurja, and Sikandrabad are in charge of Assistant Surgeons. The dispensaries of Anupshahr, Jahangirabad, and Dibai are in charge of Sub-Assistant Surgeons. Lachman Das Jatia's Zenana Hospital, Khurja, was built in 1919 by the liberality of Rai Bahadur Seth Ganga Sagar at a cost of Rs. 42,000. It is in charge of a lady of Dufferin Fund. The other Zenana Hospital is at Bulandshahr. The District Board maintains one travelling dispensary.

The following figures of the attendance of patients at the hospitals of the district tell their own tale:—

Expenditure by the District Board on the maintenance of hospitals amounts to Rs. 48,458 including the contributions made by municipalities and notified areas.

The influenza epidemic of 1918 carried away about 60,000 inhabitants; malaria is still responsible for great loss of life; during 1919—23; 154,297 persons died of malaria. In 1923 plague made a re-appearance after an interval of four years and caused 911 deaths. In 1924 a large area of the district was affected and the mortality will be much higher.

An examination of under-trial prisoners indicated that about 80 per cent. of the population is infected with hookworm.

Chapter I, page 59.—PRICES AND WAGES.

As a result of the Great War (1914—19) there has been a marked all-round rise in prices and wages since 1916. Special mention may be made of building materials, wages of skilled and unskilled labour and cattle.

Building materials.—Of the building materials kankar is found almost all over the district. But as some of the principal quarries were found to be in danger of depletion, Government in 1919 prohibited export from the district into other provinces.

In addition, the landholder is allowed 4 annas per 100 cubic feet as compensation for disturbance of the surface. Since 1916 the cost at the mouth of the pit has risen from about Rs. 2 to Rs. 2-8 per 100 cubic feet. The cost of carriage per mile has increased from 8 annas to Re. 1. In the city of Bulandshahr bricks are cheaper than in the neighbouring districts. The present price of 1st class bricks is Rs. 11 per 1,000, having in 1922 gone up to Rs. 15. It is expected to revert to Rs. 10, its former level. Inferior and 2nd quality bricks have risen from Rs. 6 to Rs. 9. The most useful wood for building purposes, viz. sal, is imported from outside. It has risen from Rs. 2 to Rs. 3-8 per cubic foot, and so has shisham wood. The prices of nim and mango woods have also almost doubled themselves, rising from about 4 annas to 8 annas per cubic foot. The increase in the cost of kankar lime has been nearly 50 per cent. The price having risen from Rs. 20 to Rs. 30 per 100 cubic feet.

Wages.—The increase in the cost of labour both skilled and unskilled is not only due to general economic conditions but also to the fact that a large number of workmen from this district have for a number of years found employment on the great building operations at Delhi. The wages of skilled labourers such as blacksmiths, carpenters, masons, stone-cutters has risen cent per cent. from 8 annas or 12 annas to Re. 1 or Rs. 1-8 per day. The same rise is noticeable in other crafts also such as potters, shoe-makers and goldsmith who are now respectively earning 12 annas, Rs. 1-8, Rs. 3 instead of 6 annas, 12 annas, and Rs. 1-5 in 1915. Similarly a farrier who eight or nine years age used to charge Re. 1 for shoeing a horse now charges Rs. 2.

There has been a proportionate increase in the wages of unskilled labour. Up to 1915 a full-grown man's daily wages used to be 4 annas, a female's 3 annas, and a boy's 2 annas. They are now receiving 8 annas, 6 annas, and 4 annas respectively though the rates may be somewhat lower to those employed in their own villages. In the villages payment of wages in kind is growing unpopular and there is now more payment in cash than in grain.

Cattle.—During the last eight or nine years there has been considerable rise in the price of cattle. A pair of desi bullocks

which formerly used to cost about Rs. 100 cannot now be had for less than Rs. 150. The price of superior breeds has similarly risen from about Rs. 200 or Rs. 250 to Rs. 300 or Rs. 350 per pair. The cost of a bull-buffalo has risen from Rs. 30 to Rs. 50. The price of cow-buffaloes depends upon quality of milk yielded by it. The desi variety is less expensive, costing about Rs. 80 to Rs. 100. Formerly they could be had for Rs. 50 or Rs. 60. The average price of a Hariyana cow buffalo has risen from Rs. 100 to Rs. 150.

Chapter II, page 33.—AGRICULTURE.

The area of the district according to village papers is 1,219,394 acres; out of which uncultivated area is 136,693 acres. The area of culturable waste now amounts to 198,681 acres as compared to 193,592 acres in 1902. The cultivated area is 884,020 acres as compared to 894,623 of 1902.

The principal crops of the district continue to be wheat, sugarcane, and cotton. Cultivated area under wheat and cotton has not changed much since 1902. But there is marked increase in the area under sugarcane cultivation. In 1902 the area under sugarcane was 33,655 acres: now it is 62,189 acres, almost all of which is irrigated. Area under indigo cultivation, once a very important crop of the district, had fallen to 5,577 acres in 1915. But the commencement of the Great War and the consequent stoppage of the import of synthetic indigo increased the cultivation again as the following figures show:—

But since 1919, the area has been falling: it stood at 9,989 acres in 1923.

The establishment of the Bulandshahr district farm has been of very great assistance in agricultural development. It was started in 1914. It covers an area of 25 acres and is situated on the Bulandshahr-Meerut road, two miles from the town. The object of the farm is to test and distribute better varieties of crops and also to serve the purpose of demonstrating improved methods of tillage. It also supplies pure and good quality of

seeds to cultivators. The farm has been successful in introducing and popularizing the following new varieties of crops, giving very high yield in the district:—

Cotton .- Aligarh white flower.

Gram .- Aligarh yellow and Pusa no. 5.

Wheat .- Pusa no. 12.

Sugarcane.—Coimbatore no. 213.

In sugarcane the farm has succeeded in establishing the cultivation of M16, Barbados 1,529, Mauritius no. 33, and Mauritius Red-Stripped.

The farm is under the supervision of Agricultural department under the Western circle.

Agricultural school was established on the 1st October, 1921. It is situated adjacent to Wallipura bridge of the Upper Ganges canal, two miles from the town of Bulandshahr-Chola road. It covers an area of 75 acres, 50 acres are under cultivation and the rest is occupied by building. The school imparts in Vernacular the same instruction that the Cawnpore Agricultural College provides in English for students of its junior course. The period of instruction is two years, and lads of zamindars and tenants are admitted to school. At present there are 45 students on the rolls. The staff consists of one principal and four instructors. The buildings have cost about Rs. 2,00,000.

The special feature of the instruction is its practical aspect. The work is conducted on the Batai principle, according to Dr. Leake's system. From 1924 the school has been made Agricultural Training Centre for town school teachers of the whole province.

Chapter III, page 70.—CENSUS OF 1921.

The last decennial census was taken on the 18th March, 1921, when the district was found to contain 1,066,519 persons as against 1,123,132 in 1911. The slight fall in the population during the decade finds its explanation in the fact that in 1911-12 there was an outbreak of plague, followed by cholera in several places, and in 1918-19 there was the disastrous influenza epidemic which swept away large numbers both from the country and the towns. The average density fell from 587.2 to 560.1 inhabitants to the square mile. The number of males in the

district was found to be 562,529, while that of females 503,990. Of the total population, 913,303 lived in villages and 153,216 in towns. Classified according to religion there were 828,128 Hindus, 199,041 Muhammadans, 12,411 Christians, 25,758 Aryans, 1,099 Jains, 71 Sikhs, 6 Brahmos, and 5 Parsis.

Of the three municipalities in the district Bulandshahr was the least affected by the unhealthy conditions of the decade, and being the headquarters of the district gained much by immigration. Its population rose from 19,383 to 19,509. But the case was otherwise with Khurja and Sikandrabad which owing to their being thickly populated, suffered considerably by the ravages of plague and influenza. The population of the former fell from 27,387 to 25,719 and of the latter from 18,946 to 16,857.

Military service.

Reference is made elsewhere to the services of the district in the Great War: it is interesting to note the contributions of certain communities to the combatant ranks:—

Chapter III, page 92 to 110.—Some leading families.

At the recent settlement the land revenue payable by members of the Skinner family amounted to over Rs. 50,000. But the portion of the Skinner heritage, known as the Fargus Skinner Estate and owned by the descendants of Major Hercules Skinner, has now been reduced by voluntary sales to eight villages and some shares. The Fort is included in the estate of the late Richard Ross Skinner, which is administered by Major Stanley Skinner of Hansi.

The Pindrawal estate was, in 1906, devided between Syed Jafar Ali Khan and his younger brother Syed Asghar Ali Khan. The improvidence of the former led to a great diminution of the main portion of the estate, which has been under the management of the Court of Wards since 5-8-1910.

The present proprietor is Syed Akbar Ali Khan.

The Dharampur estate now consists of two main portions owned respectively by Khan Bahadur Kunwar Obaid Ullah Khan, M.B.E., and M. Abdul Jalil Khan and his brothers. of litigation between the owners and between owners and tenants, these estates are in a prosperous condition. Mumtaz-ud-daula Sir Mohammad Faiyaz Ali Khan of Pahasu. K.C.I.E., K.C.V.O., C.S.I., died in 1922. His son, Kr. Ikram Ali Khan, had predeceased him and his elder grandson, Mohammad Mokarram Ali Khan, succeeded to the title. The late Nawab had applied the Agra Estates Act to his property in this province but after his death a suit was instituted contesting the validity of his action. At a very early stage, however, a settlement was reached confirming the present Nawab in the ownership of land paying a revenue of Rs. 26,220. (In Bulandshahr and Aligarh districts) and assigning to him the family mansions. A substantial estate was allotted to Musammat Razi-ul-nisa Begam, daughter of the late Nawab and wife of M. Yusuf Ali Khan, proprietor of Anona, and several villages were assigned to Kr. Moazzam Ali Khan, brother of the present Nawab, and to to his two sisters, who are married to sons of M. Yusuf Ali Khan.

The Chhatari estate was released from Court of Wards' management in 1909, and is in a flourishing condition. The proprietor, Lieut. Nawab Hafiz Mohammad Ahmad Said Khan, C.I.E., M.B.E., M.L.C., became a Minister in the Government of the United Provinces in 1923.

The Shikarpur estate was taken under Court of Wards' management in 1913 on the death of Chaudhri Ram Sarup. It was released in 1921 on its present owner, Chaudhri Raghuraj Singh, attaining his majority.

Chapter IV, page 113.—DISTRICT STAFF.

Increase in litigation in the district has been very great and to cope with it the district staff has further been strengthened. It now consists of four full powered Sub-Divisional Officers, two Deputy Collectors, 1st class, and one Treasury Officer. The number of Honorary Magistrates has been raised from 19 in 1916 to 43 in 1924, and there are seven Honorary Assistant Collectors.

Chapter IV, page 114.—CIVIL JURISDICTION.

The committee of 1908 on the reorganization of judicial staff presided over by Mr. Richard Greeven, I.C.S., recommended the appointment both of a District and Sessions Judge and of a Subordinate Judge at Bulandshahr with jurisdiction throughout the revenue district of Bulandshahr. This recommendation was given effect to on 1st November, 1921, but the District and Sessions Judge and the Subordinate Judge continued to hold court at Aligarh, until 2nd October, 1922, when they moved to Bulandshahr. The spacious and handsome law courts designed by Mr. Lishman were formally opened by His Excellency the Governor in February, 1924. There are two munsifs in the district, with headquarters at Bulandshahr and Khurja. The Munsif of Bulandshahr exercises original civil jurisdiction over the parganas of Agauta, Baran, and Siyana of Bulandshahr tahsil and Anupshahr and Ahar of tahsil Anupshahr. The parganas of Shikarpur of tahsil Bulandshahr and Dibai of tahsil Anupshahr with all the parganas of Khurja lie within the jurisdiction of Munsif Khurja. Sikandrabad tahsil still forms part of Munsifi of Ghaziahad.

Chapter IV, page 27 .- FOURTH REGULAR SETTLEMENT.

Settlement operation began in 1915 with the appointment of an Assistant Record Officer. In 1916 Mr. E. A. Phelps was appointed Settlement Officer; and the last of the new assessments was announced in 1919.

Though the average proportion of assets fixed as revenue amounted to only 45.42, the increase over the expiring demand (Rs. 1,790,335) reached a total of Rs. 6,85,000 or 34.73 per cent. Owing to the system of progressive enhancements, the full demand will not in all cases be payable until 1930.

The incidence of revenue on the cultivated area rose from Rs. 2-6-0 per acre to Rs. 3-3. Circle rent rates for non-occupancy tenants varied from 28.8 to Rs. 3-5-0 per acre the soil being classified as Bara, Agela, Jungle I, Jungle II, Dakra I, Dakra II, and each of these being sub-divided into irrigated and unirrigated. On the average a non-occupancy circle rate exceeds the corresponding occupancy circle rate by 50 per cent.

The settlement was made for the usual period of 30 years: but 11 mahals in pargana Dadri and 35 in pargana Dankor were given quinquennial settlements owing to their being subject to fluvial action: and in the same parganas 42 other mahals received short-term settlement on other grounds.

Certain favours were granted to proprietors in Military Service. All such were exempted for their lifetime, from all enhancement of revenue. As most of these affected were but petty proprietors, the initial cost of this concession amounted to only Rs. 2,219 per annum. A similar concession was granted to two proprietors who had given rental reductions in order to encourage enlistment.

Unconnected with the settlement were the Jagirs awarded in the form of remissions or assignments of land revenue to certain individuals distinguished by their War work.

Chapter IV, page 131.—Police.

The number of thanas is now 16. Of these in existence in 1903 Ahar, Khanpur, Arniyan, and Sarai Sadar have been abolished Ramghat has been reduced to the status of an outpost, but there is a proposal to re-erect it into a thana. There is an outpost at Basi also.

The regular police force consists of 654 men of all grades. The separate forces of Police in Municipalities and of chaukidar in town areas have been abolished.

The village chaukidars have recently been greatly reduced in number. Of them there are now 1,050: one to every 872.57 inhabitants, according to the 1921 census.

Chapter IV, page 133.—Excise.

Country liquor.—The ordinary distillery system was replaced by the contract system for the supply of country liquor in April, 1918. The Indian Distillery Company, Cawnpore, at present holds the monopoly for the supply of liquor to this district at the fixed rate of Re. 1-6-6 per bulk gallon of 35° under proof strength. A bonded warehouse for the storage and issue of liquor to the vendors has been established by the Government at the District Headquarters. Liquor is issued to the vendors

at the fixed strength of 35° U. P. and adulteration with water is strictly forbidden which was not the case under the ordinary distillery system.

The consumption of country liquor increased as everywhere else and it reached the large figure of 10,856 L. P. gallons in 1913-14, but with the gradual enhancement of duty and licence fee the consumption steadily decreased and in 1920-21 it stood at 8,916 L. P. gallons. The cumulative effect of the heavy enhancement of duty, of the economic depression, of the unfavourable agricultural seasons, and of the non-cooperation movement under the garb of temperance activities was that the consumption suddenly fell to 4,056 L. P. gallons in 1921-22.

Since April, 1922 the old system for the settlement of shops by auction has been replaced by the graduated surcharge system, under which the licence fee is assessed according to a fixed scale and the liquor is sold by the vendors at a fixed price. Simultaneously the sale strength of liquor was reduced from 25° U. P. to 35° U. P., shops were abolished by 30 per cent., the working hours of the shops were curtailed from 11 to 7 hours, and a retail price for the liquor was fixed. But in spite of all these impediments in the way of consumption the figures for 1922-23 were punctually the same as that for 1921-22, namely 4,225 L P. gallons. No district of equal population has such a small consumption.

There are 34 retail country liquor shops in the whole district, while formerly there were 53. There has been no increase in crimes.

Opium.—Opium still continues to be in great use in this district. Its consumption was apparently highest in 1913-14, when it amounted to 2,109 seers. It may, however, be remarked that this figure does not represent the actual consumption of the district. A considerable portion of this opium was smuggled to Calcutta and Burma. The gradual but very heavy enhancement of duty suppressed the smuggling and the recorded consumption fell to 1,276 seers in 1920-21. Opium was not in any way adversely affected by the political agitation of 1921-22 and its consumption stood at 1,235 seers in that year.

The auction system for the settlement of opium shops also was replaced by the graduated surcharge system for the assessment of licence fee and the number of shops was reduced from 35 to 34, from April, 1922 yet the consumption was not much affected. It amounted to 1,106 seers in 1922-23 and is still the highest as compared with other districts of the province excepting Cawnpore, Allahabad, Benares, Lucknow, and Aligarh which are not only larger than this district but also include big cities. The number of opium shops is also the largest in the province excepting Cawnpore and Gorakhpur.

The consumption of opium in the form of chandu and madak still continues on a great scale. The highest number of cases for the illegal manufacture and possession of opium including chandu during the last 10 years was 16 in 1919-20; it fell to 8 in 1920-21, 10 in 1921-22. There was only one case in 1922-23 but this does not mean that chandu-smoking has much decreased.

Hemp drugs.—The consumption of charas has much decreased. It was 906 seers in 1901. It fell to 419 seers in 1920-21, and it amounted to only 143 seers in 1921-22, during which year abnormal conditions were prevailing. But a fairly large portion of the recorded consumption of 1920-21 actually took place during 1921-22,

The auction system for the settlement of shops was replaced by the graduated surcharge system and the number of shops was reduced from 34 to 21 from 1st April, 1922. The consumption in 1922-23 amounted to 244 seers. The consumption of bhang has also gradually decreased and it amounted to 758 seers in 1922-23. The total duty for hemp drugs in 1922-23 amounted to Rs. 9,291.

Cocains.—Cocaine was an unknown thing to an ordinary layman in 1901. It was in 1909-10 that the residents of this district took to its use and Delhi was the source of supply. In a short time a number of persons in Bulandshahr, Sikandrabad, and Khurja towns fell victims to this bad habit. There was a lull in the trade of this drug during the Great War, but it has revived since the close of War. Sikandrabad town is at present most notorious in this respect. There were 15 cases of illegal

possession of cocaine in 1913-14 and there were no cases during 1918-19 to 1920-21. In 1922-23 there were six cases.

Excise revenue.—The total excise revenue stood at Rs. 1,26,641 in 1913-14. By 1920-21 it amounted to Rs. 2,17,700 but in 1921-22 fell to Rs. 1,97,969 and in 1922-23 to Rs. 1,42,448.

Chapter IV, page 138 .- EDUCATION.

English Schools.—During the last decade the expansion of English education in the district has been very rapid. There are at present six high schools and two middle schools distributed over the district. Besides these, the old Edward Coronation High School at Khurja has reached the status of a College under its new name "Nathi Mal Ram Sahai Mal Edward Coronation Intermediate College."

The high and middle schools are situated as follows:-

King Edward Memorial Jat High School, Lakhaoti. Founded in 1912.

Kubair High School, Debai Dayanand Anglo-Vedic

Middle School, Bulandshahr.

Rajput School, Pahasu
(Middle).

Ditto in 1898.

The enrolment is about 2,000.

Vernacular Schools.—The expansion of Vernacular education in the district has been as satisfactory as the spread of English education. There are at present 14 District Board Town Schools including two aided town schools, at the following places:—

(1) Bulandshahr, (2) Shikarpur, (3) Syana, (4) Gulaothi, (5) Jahangirabad, (6) Anupshahr, (7) Dibai, (8) Sikandrabad, (9) Dankaur, (10) Dadri, (11) Khurja, (12) Jewar, (13) Eulandshahr Mission, (14) Bulandshahr Arya School.

The number of scholars in these in March, 1924, stood at 1,065. The primary and preparatory schools number 222 with an enrolment of 12,100. There are nine separate Islamia primary and preparatory schools with 363 scholars.

The Municipality of Bulandshahr introduced free and compulsory primary education within its limits in January, 1923. The number of Municipal state schools and aided mixed schools and aided maktabs is 26 with an enrolment of 1,547. Schools for depressed classes number aix with an enrolment of 111. Indigenous schools number 115 with 2,346 scholars.

Progress in girls education has been less marked. The district now possesses eight District Board Girls' schools and seven District Board Aided Girls' schools. There are six Municipal Girls' schools including one Maktab. The enrolment of all girls' schools stands at 874.

Rupees 1,70,500 are spent on boys' vernacular education and Rs. 7,575 are spent on the education of girls.

REPRESENTATION IN THE LEGISLATURE.

For the (Provincial) Legislative Council, the district contains three constituencies—one Mohammadan and two (Bulandshahr East and Bulandshahr West) Non-Mohammadan. The latter comprise Bulandshahr-cum-Anupshahr (25,321 voters) and Khurja-cum-Sikandrabad (21,093 voters) tabsils respectively. The Mohammadan constituency contains 8,429 voters.

The district forms part of Agra Landholders' North Constituency, with 41 voters. For the European constituency and Allahabad University constituency there are 13 and 63 voters respectively in the district. For the Legislative Assembly the district forms part of Meerut division Non-Mohammadan Rural constituency and Meerut division Mohammadan Rural constituency with 8,442 and 1,319 voters respectively.

For the landholders and European constituencies of Legislative Assembly respectively there are 41 and 10 voters.

Chapter IV, page 139.—DISTRICT BOARD.

According to the District Board Act, of 1922 the Collector ceased to be ex-officio Chairman from 15th April, 1923.

District Board elections were held in April and May, 1923.

Two are nominated members; one representing the depressed classes. Nawab Ahmad Said Khan., C.I.E., of Chhatari was the first elected Chairman of the Board. He vacated office on his appointment as a Minister of the United Provinces Government. Rai Bahadur Chaudri Amar Singh, O.B.E., is now the elected non-official Chairman of the Board. The Board suffers from financial stringency and finds difficulty in maintaining its metalled roads.

Chapter IV, page 139.—VILLAGE PANCHAYAIS.

The Village Panchayat Act of 1920 has been extended over the whole district. The first panchayat in the district was established on the 1st of August, 1921. At present there are 12, 11, 20 and 16 panchayats in tahsils Bulandshahr, Anupshahr, Sikandrabad and Khurja respectively.

The working of the panchayats promises to be successful.

Chapter V, page 166,—RECENT HISTORY.

During the Great War of 1914—1918 the Bulandshahr district distinguished itself by its recruiting efforts. At the end of the War it was represented by a greater number of combatant than any other district in the Province; and had also raised the largest quota of non-combatants. Mr. Mumford, Collector (1915—1919), Mr. H. H. Shaw, Deputy Collector, and a large number of non-official gentlemen received titles or decorations. Among these may be mentioned the hereditary titles of Nawab and the M.B.E. bestowed on Ahmad Said Khan of Chhatari the hereditary title of Rao Bahadur, as well as the O.B.E., given to Chaudhri Amar Singh of Pali. Further Jagirs varying in value from Rs. 1,000 per annum downwards were awarded to 16 persons.

The Settlement of the district by Mr. E.A. Phelps was completed in 1919.

In 1920—22 the district did not entirely escape the infection of the non-co-operation agitation, but its manifestations were confined mostly to the larger towns.

In 1924 the district celebrated the centenary of its separate existence, His Excellency Sir William Marris, Governor of the United Provinces, opened the new Law Courts and the Prince of Wales' Hospital, and laid the foundation stone of the Roberts Reading Room, an institution destined for the use of retired Indian Military officers, of whom the district contains a large number.
